Now is the time to show off what Northwood has to offer!



From the Chairman

INTRODUCTION

Well, the saga of the proposed station development has started again. A report on the initial consultations is produced on page 5. I would encourage all residents to get involved at the next stage when plans will be shown to us. One thing is certain, Northwood is losing traders, buildings are looking worn and we need something special to bring life back to our town. Maybe an influx of new shops and residents will do this.

"Save our Northwood" still has over £18,000 in the kitty and will no doubt be involved at a later stage.

MEMBERSHIP

We now have a data-base of over 600 email addresses which enables us to send emails updating members of any news and development. This is an important step forward, bringing us into the 21st century. There are probably more than 1500 of you with access to the internet who have still to register. Please DO register your email address with us. See the Chief Road Steward's report on Page 5. And of course, if you change your contact details, do let us know.

STANDARD OF DRIVING

Time for a moan! The police tell us that the majority of motorists caught speeding in Northwood are actually Northwood residents. A few weeks ago a woman in a 'Chelsea tractor' overtook me on a speed hump forcing me to take evasive action. She then accelerated to well over 60mph ignoring the 20mph limit, and other speed humps. I noted her registration and reported the incident to the Safer Neighbourhood team and she was cautioned by a police officer.

At the risk of offending some members, such drivers are antisocial, as well as dangerous, and are not welcome in Northwood.

PLANNING

You will read below that we no longer have a committee member responsible for planning.

We are getting an increasing number of planning applications that need careful investigation. St Helen's School, which is in the conservation area, has recently applied to demolish the Fitzwilliam building, a beautiful Victorian house in Eastbury Road. The plan is to replace it by a modern building.

In addition, Northwood College has held a consultation with residents with a view to constructing another modern building in the conservation area of Maxwell Road. Personally, I found the building extremely ugly and I made some suggestions as to how the frontage could be improved to be more visually acceptable. This went down like a lead balloon with the young architect. The plans also reduce the number of staff parking spaces which will lead to more congestion.

REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY

The usual ceremony will take place on Sunday, 11th November starting at 10.30 in Green Lane. Being 100 years since the end of the 1914-18 war, the ceremony will be even more significant than usual. I do hope



you will all make a special effort to attend.

COMMITTEE AND OFFICERS

I regret to report that our President Alan Prue's recovery from his stroke is very slow and I am sure you will all wish him and his wife well.

We owe a big thank you to David Goodman who left us after five years in the planning role.

Our Secretary, Ros Plume has been co-opted to the committee as has Sue Mansfield, our new Minutes Secretary.

No-one has stuck their head above the parapet to take over from me as Chairman. I have now served for nearly ten years. I believe I am still making a worthwhile contribution and continue to enjoy the challenge – yes, it can be hard work – but I do believe the NRA would benefit from new blood. Perhaps next year??

My fellow committee members and I spend many hours working hard on your behalf to make Northwood a good place to live. Traffic and Highways

NORTHWOOD TRAFFIC STUDY

At the risk of repeating myself, LBH has carried out a transport study for the following roads:-

- A404 Rickmansworth Road
- B469 Green Lane between Rickmansworth Road and Maxwell Road
- Maxwell Road

A report has been written, but, at the time of writing, it has not yet been submitted for review by Cllr. Burrows, Cabinet Member for Planning, Transportation and Recycling, as discussions are still continuing between council officers and the contractors who carried out the work. Watch this space!

PARKING CONSULTATIONS

As reported in the last issue of the Newsletter, informal consultations with local residents have taken place in Northwood. The report was completed and reviewed by Cllr. Burrows. The recommendations are as follows:

- I. Instruct officers to design and formally consult on a Resident Parking Permit Scheme in the following roads:
- a. Grove Road, Hallowell Road, Harrison Close, Kewferry Road, Mezan Close, Moor Park Road, Roy Road (including Barker Close), Treetops Close and The Avenue, Residents' Permit Parking Scheme operated Monday-Friday Ipm-2pm.
- b. Gateway Close, Residents' Permit Parking Scheme operated Monday-Friday 9am-5pm.
- c. Myrtleside Close, Residents' Permit Parking Scheme operated Monday-Saturday 10-11am and 3-4pm.

- 2. Instruct officers to formally consult on a Stop & Shop Scheme in the eastern side lay-bys of High Street, Northwood.
- Defer taking any further action in Chelwood Close, Closemead Close, High Street (west side), Langland Court, Langton Grove, Mallard Way, Reginald Road, Rising Hill Close, Sandy Lodge Way and Wedgewood Close.

I understand that it is hoped to deliver the relevant information to the addresses of involved residents for the formal consultation early in December 2018. These documents will differ for each individual road and three weeks will be allowed for responses to be returned to the council. It is **very important** that as many responses as possible are received by LBH because decisions will be made and a low level of returns could result in minority choices being implemented.

BREAKSPEAR ROAD SOUTH

A little further afield, HS2 is now making its presence felt. There have already been closures of Breakspear Road South, but further ones are planned, specifically starting on Monday, 22nd October, and continuing for five weeks. There will be more to come.

Metropolitan Line

THE RUNNING OF THE MET LINE CONTINUES TO **EXACERBATE THE PLIGHT** of regular commuters with continual signal failures and lack of communication. As if to rub salt into the wounds, we also had a tree on the track at one stage causing a few hours of delays - at least we can't blame the Victorian signalling for that one! Frustratingly the signal failures appear to have increased despite the dry weather over the summer. One problem is that LUL is nursing an old system that is well past its replacement date, with most of the system being nearly 60 years old and some parts even older. There are some new problems caused by the S stock which is wearing the rails in a different way from the old A stock. As a result, there is spalling of the rails with some fragments crossing the insulating gaps between signalling sections. Actions to remedy this problem include widening the insulating gaps, using magnetic sweepers to remove the spalled metal and some reprofiling of the rails. The result has been a reduction in signal failures recently whereas the number of failures was well over the target in a three-month summer period. That is your technical lesson for the month.

IN BETTER NEWS we are told the Monday to Wednesday closure of the Metropolitan line (due to drains and track work at Finchley Road) from town to Wembley from 10pm will finish at the end of the year as originally

promised. Something on track (excuse the pun!), it will certainly be a first. But before you get excited about the prospect of Night Tube, I am afraid that is still a long way off (years) due to our old friend 'upgrading of the track and signalling' work.



We are aware of noise from the Met line trains causing irritation to our residents and beyond. Furthermore, unannounced works have been taking place in the rail sidings in the early hours of the morning. It's quite a challenge to find the right people to talk to at TfL about this. Let us know if you are experiencing similar issues.

IN WIDER LOCAL NEWS, at least 400 new homes will be built on the car parks of three Harrow tube stations as part of a development scheme led by the Mayor of London. The projects, which boast 100 per cent affordability targets, will make use of space at Canons Park, Stanmore and Rayners Lane underground stations.

Finally, the common-sense Croxley link looks dead in the

water as politicians could not come to an agreement on the funding.

Station Approach Development - from the consultants' point of view



Notting Hill Genesis and Transport for London hosted three successful drop-in events for Northwood Station Quarter at St Matthew's Church on Hallowell Road on 10th, 11th & 12th October.

Invitations to the event were sent to 7,500 Northwood households and businesses and posters were provided for display at the station, local places of worship and the library. We would like to thank Northwood Residents Association for distributing the posters locally and advertising the event on their website.

We were delighted that across the three days, 537 Northwood residents attended the events.

Residents were able to be introduced to our new project team including Transport for London, their development partner Notting Hill Genesis and the Architect Hawkins\Brown.

Members of the team took the opportunity to engage with as many residents as we could, answering questions and taking on feedback. A significant number of residents provided extensive and constructive feedback for the team. To date, we have received over 150 feedback forms via the website and post and they continue to come in.

We are currently in the process of considering all your feedback as we draw up more detailed proposals, as well as bearing in mind the feedback from the previous application's consultation.

Residents were pleased that the proposals will include step free access to Northwood Station and the scheme will not include a supermarket. Other themes also included whether improvements can be made to the bus interchange and questions were raised regarding parking, height and affordable housing.

In the coming months we will be hosting more events showcasing the proposals in more detail. Once again we will drop invitations through letter boxes and advertise locally. We encourage all residents to take part in future engagement.

I left the Consultation feeling very uneasy having been told that there would be fewer station parking places, that five storeys high was not high rise, the whole of the current car park would be flats, most of the flats would be one or two beds and little provision made for families. Northwood needs affordable housing for young professional families who are trying to get on the housing ladder. We need our policemen, teachers and nurses to live locally.

I was also told that considerable savings have been made on the original plans from which I surmised that we will end up with a dense development of high-rise flats, the result being a miniature Harrow

-like centre with a few shops which will, no doubt, be too expensive for our current traders to occupy.

Now we have to wait and see what plans evolve. I urge you all to take part in the next consultation and make your views known.

ichael Sobell Hospice - Update from the Charity's CEO

There has been much behind-the-scenes work by the charity as we continue to drive the NHS Trust providers of the hospice building and the clinical service to make a decision on the future of the inpatient unit.



Meetings have been held with the Clinical Commissioning Group, who fund the service and are committed to there being provision of palliative care beds in the North of Hillingdon. The charity is now a member of the Hillingdon End of Life Care working group. We have met with, and received support from the Michael Sobell Foundation, and remain in close contact with them, as well as with Nick Hurd MP. The charity is invited by Hillingdon Council to the External Services Select Committee meeting on 30th October. Also invited are Hillingdon Clinical Commissioning Group; Hillingdon Hospital NHS Trust and East and North Herts NHS Trust, all of whom have responsibility for the Hospice and its patients.

OUR ACTIONS TO THE END OF DECEMBER ARE:

- ⇒ To work with the NHS leaders to put concrete proposals on the table by the end of 2018 patients in our community must see progress and agreement on the way forward over the autumn.
- ⇒ To keep fundraising for our current day care services, based in Michael Sobell Hospice. The day centre is fully funded by us and cannot operate without donations.

From the Treasurer

As it is likely all subs for 2017 have now been received and the membership database therefore accurate it enables analysis to be completed. Yes, I did write **2017**, hopefully all subs for 2018 will be received prior to our financial year end on 31st December 2018.

One of the most common questions I am asked is why are the subs so low? Another is why are subs just not £5? Both perfectly reasonable questions and both have been debated many times over the years.

At the NRA's foundation in 1966, the subs were "Husband and wife 7/6. Single subscription 5/-". By 1976 it was 50p (10 shillings) per household, before doubling to £1 in 1990 and doubling again to the current minimum of £2 in 2002. As long as our income meets or exceeds our expenditure we remain a viable organisation. The risks we have are not financial but in maintaining high membership and interest so we have sufficient Road Stewards and committee members.

In 2017 40% of our members did pay the £2 minimum, which means 60% paid more than £2. The total residential subs received were £8,271. We have other income so in total we received £11,073 which was just a little less than the £12,171 we spent. The spend figure was higher than usual since the AGM

approved some significant donations.

The income and expenditure usually roughly balance so there is no need to increase the subs - that answers the first question. A £5 sub does have some rational positives. It is the lowest denomination paper note so could be easier to pay than hunting around for a few £1 or £2 coins. Many ATMs do not dispense £5 notes so they are not necessarily as available as one would think and since cash is used less getting a fiver in the change happens less often. Of course, a tenner can be used, 9% of members did pay that sum.

VALUE FOR MONEY. When you consider a weekday newspaper costs between 35p and £2, a cup of coffee is around £2 and a bar of chocolate around 75p, a £5 sub is very reasonable. What it provides is a full colour, three times a year newsletter, the website, push email notifications of items of interest to members, the efforts of the committee members in maintaining our objectives, the Road Stewards who provide another conduit to reach the committee members and to ensure residents' views are known.

Assuming we did increase the sub and everyone did pay the increased number, we would have a greater income, but unless members can identify additional things we can spend the money on any increase would just add to reserves. Not a bad thing since there is always the possibility of something unusual requiring funds to represent our members. Of course, not all current members may wish to pay a higher sub so the overall membership may reduce. That is undesirable since the more members we have the stronger our position. As such the current situation appears optimal. We encourage subs of £5 or more, but the minimum remains £2. As long as 60% of us do continue to pay the higher subs we will remain financially sound. Prices do rise so I am sure at some point we will need to raise the minimum, if everyone voluntarily paid £5 or more, it would happen by default.

I shall end with my usual plea for subs to be provided promptly to the Road Stewards, please make their jobs as easy as possible, so have a cheque ready, payable to "Northwood Residents' Association", or have the cash, ideally folding money ready. If you receive a collection envelope, please place your sub in it and return promptly to your Road Steward or Sharman or Carter Chemists; it avoids your Road Steward having to chase for payment.

A Message from Nick Hurd MP

Regular readers will know my long-standing frustration with the neglect of the Northwood and Pinner Cottage Hospital. With superb support from Northwood Residents' Association, I have been campaigning for the NHS to honour past promises and retain community health facilities on the site. It has required patience because the NHS does not like to be rushed into decisions.

Still, there is good news. In a recent meeting with the Chairman of the Hillingdon CCG, he confirmed his intention to use the Hospital as the site for a "hub" of new primary care services to help keep people out of hospital. In addition the NHS seems committed to upgrading the Northwood Health Centre and moving it into the main Cottage Hospital building. There will need to be some redevelopment of the rest of the site for residential accommodation to help finance it, and I hope this will be focused on sheltered/extra care accommodation. This is a compromise, but a much better outcome than we faced a year ago when it looked like the

I will continue to keep a close eye on Northwood and Pinner, but my growing frustration is now with the future of Mount Vernon, not least given the uncertainty around the much-



loved Michael Sobell Hospice. Two NHS trusts share responsibility for this site but neither seems to have a plan for Mount Vernon, which is secondary to them both. To my eyes it is looking increasingly run down, and I do not want the constituency to lose a Hospice. More on this in future articles, but I would welcome input from constituents. Environment

SINGING TRAINS!

The Metropolitan line trains stopping at Northwood station appear to be producing a new singing or whistling sound quite a high-pitched note actually. The fast Met. line and Chiltern line services appear unaffected. What is happening is that a noise is being generated from the track. This is a result of some rail grinding work London Underground (LU) carried out at the beginning of August. The rails are reground to keep them in good condition and to even out any corrugation, but unfortunately, this can lead to a period of high-pitched noise afterwards which is unavoidable. This effect is usually only temporary and should dissipate naturally as the rails start to get rougher again, but that may take some time.

NOISY NIGHT WORKS

Residents living near the station and sidings may have become aware of recent night working by LU staff and contractors that has included trackside work in association with the construction of the new signalling building. It is understood that the preparation work should now be complete, LU has indicated that the work will recommence at the end of October and last for approximately three weeks.

We know that Hillingdon Council has advised London Underground that an application under the Control of Pollution Act 1974; Section 61 should be made before the commencement of any works.

UNSAFE CONTRACTOR WORKING - AN EXAMPLE



This picture was taken in Rickmansworth Road one

September morning where a delivery of materials to a building site occasioned a fork lift truck to reverse across the busy main road then approach the side of the lorry to load up before backing off and finally delivering materials to the site, without the contractor's staff stopping the traffic.

Here you can see example of where there is an absence of corporate social responsibility and poor working practice by the Managing Contractor. By luck no passing vehicle or occupants were hurt. Drivers, please be alert as you pass major works and building sites as safe work practice may not always be high on the agenda.

PAVEMENT OBSTRUCTION & OVER-HANGING FOLIAGE

Looking at this picture, the front hedge seems well manicured. Look more closely and you can see that the homeowner's garden contractor has failed to consider pedestrians or people pushing prams and pushchairs as there is insufficient room to get comfortably between the post and the hedge. Overgrown gardens can obstruct.



Whether it is hedges, foliage, overhanging tree branches that make walking difficult or restrict headroom, or groundcover plants that encroach on Northwood's pavements, it matters that you cut back overgrowth to the correct place - or that you get your garden contractor to do it for you. Be a good citizen, do what is right in a timely manner.

Health Round-up

PAUL STRICKLAND SCANNER CENTRE

In the last newsletter we reported delivery of a new £1.5million charity-funded MRI scanner unit to Mount Vernon; it was officially opened by the MP Tim Farron, chairman of the All-Party Parliamentary Group on Radiotherapy, during a special event on 3rd September.

The scanner unit will bring a multitude of benefits to patients. Claire Strickland, Paul Strickland Scanner Centre Chief Executive, said: "Cutting edge scanning equipment allows clinicians to determine the exact location, size and shape of the tumour in detail in relation to surrounding normal tissue, allowing radiotherapy to be delivered with a degree of precision that wouldn't have been possible only a few years ago."

During the event, attendees also listened to a talk on next generation imaging solutions for prostate cancer diagnosis by Prof Anwar Padhani, lead consultant for MRI at Paul Strickland Scanner Centre, who is an internationally recognised expert in cancer imaging.

ON-LINE connection with own **GP** Practice

Those who are able can register with their own practice for on-line facilities, which makes life a lot easier, saves time and stress. Residents can (1) Book Appointments (2) See their own Blood Test Results and (3) Request REPEAT MEDICATION. Medication can then be delivered to their homes if requested.

It is also good practice to visit your GP at least ONCE a year for an annual checkup if you haven't been seen by the GP during the whole year (particularly applicable to those over 65 years).

LONDON AMBULANCE SERVICE

London Ambulance Service has been working closely with NHS rapid response teams across North West London, helping more patients to get the treatment they need in their own home. This enhanced way of working has seen more than 100 people a month being cared for at home. More and more people are avoiding unnecessary trips to A&E and possible hospital admission. The patient's GP will also be notified and involved in their care.

Jean Macfarlane has seen many changes in Northwood. She was born here in 1939, went to school here and married at Holy Trinity Church in 1962. Then followed a spell living in Hampstead before returning to Northwood in 1985 to care for her parents. Here are Jean's recollections of Northwood during WW2.

"Soon after I was born in Northwood war was declared in September 1939. My early memories are of hearing the airraid sirens wail, and my brother and me being put under the dining table which was solid oak, covered by an old velvet curtain – it was safe there, no Anderson shelter in our garden.

"We went to a little school along the Pinner Road opposite the Cottage Hospital where Mum was a Red Cross Nurse.

She used to pop over to the school playground when the sirens went off to make sure we children were safe whilst bombs were dropping nearby. They were aiming for the railway line where steam trains ran from Marylebone to Aylesbury. The nearest bomb to land was in Acre Way quite near to the hospital.

"My father was Station Sergeant at the mock Tudor police station, and in his spare time tended two allotments in Joel Street where we picked blackberries that left purple stains on our fingers!

"I have vague memories of being on the Hog's Back where low flying aircraft dropped fruit for the children, we had never seen a banana before. That was VE Day 1945. The street parties were soon organised – I have memories of long tables, cakes, flags and happy laughter."

TOTAL POLICING

From Sergeant Sam Quinn

Hello. I hope you all enjoyed the hot weather during the summer months. Now that Autumn is upon us and the nights are drawing in it's really important to follow some simple crime prevention steps to help deter burglary. We always tend to see a rise in this type of crime during the darker nights. Improving your lighting both inside and outside your home is a good deterrent. I would advise:

- Have good lighting at doors as it makes it safer for you when coming and going after dark.
- A clear, low white light that activates at dusk to dawn is ideal for lighting a yard and garden and allowing any person to be clearly seen.
- Check to make sure that trees and plants do not obscure your lighting. It's recommended that you regularly cut vegetation back.
- Take care to position these lights so that light pollution doesn't annoy your neighbours.
- Use an automatic plugin time switch to operate a lamp or light at pre-set times when you're away.
- Energy saving LED bulbs are best as they do not use as much electricity, last longer than conventional bulbs and do not generate heat, reducing fire risk.
- In blocks of flats, automatic low energy lights that detect movement are recommended for corridors, stairwells and communal areas such as car parks and cycle stores.

orthwood Nostalgia - responses

In response to Paul Barker's reminiscences of the Waitrose site, Stuart Johnson wrote,

"Paul Barker's memory has got things a little jumbled in the summer newsletter.

"Colliver-Fisher was Northwood's long-established car dealer. Their showrooms were in the building on the corner of Green Lane and Eastbury Road that was latterly Blockbuster and most recently Hard 8. Their garages and workshops were where Waitrose is now, on what was known during the pre-Waitrose planning battle as the Downside site. The coal yard, though, was on the up (east) side of the railway, where the station car park is now. Although coal ceased to arrive by rail in 1966, the coal merchants (latterly Charringtons and WG Charles & Co) continued to be based there for many years, using the offices in Station Approach now occupied by the barbers and Ace cars.

"The Greengrocers at the bottom of the hill in Green Lane was

Allens - I think there was a bigger one higher up, where Cook is now, but I too can't remember what it was called. There was also Northwood Fruiterers on the north side of the road at number 63, now Regal Kebab.

"I don't claim to have a photographic memory - I have in front of me the 1975 edition of Kemp's Directory of Ruislip-Northwood! At that time the mystery Green Lane shop, between MacFisheries and Sketchleys, was occupied by Wests (Butchers), but I think it became a greengrocers later."

And Jean Macfarlane's memories go back further: "Paul asked the name of the Greengrocer's in Green Lane; the family of Arthur Holmes ran that, also a shop in Northwood Hills. Arthur and his wife were long-term friends of my parents. They all belonged to an old-time dancing club in Hallowell Road and all grew prize chrysanthemums in their front gardens!! That was from 1948."

Northwood and District U3A

We usually publish news from THE UNIVERSITY OF THE THIRD AGE

Northwood and District U3A; this time we learn more fully what U3A is all about.

U3A STANDS FOR THE UNIVERSITY OF THE THIRD AGE.

Founded over 35 years ago, the U3A movement aims to encourage groups of older people to come together to enjoy life-long learning in subjects of interest to them. Each U3A pays a membership fee to the national coordinating body, The Third Age Trust. Most importantly, each U3A is an absolutely autonomous entity, self-financing and self-managing, and there are now over 1000 U3As in the UK.

The U3A is not the sort of University you might expect; there are no qualifications or degrees required or awarded, rather, each U3A is a group of people in their third age who enjoy learning for its own sake, covering a wide range of topics and activities as chosen by their members.

THE 'THIRD AGE' is defined as a time in your life where you can undertake learning for its own sake. There is no minimum age but there is a focus on people who are no longer in fulltime employment.

Because retired people have a lifetime of experience and, collectively, a vast amount of knowledge, each U3A can arrange a programme of subjects where each meeting is normally led by a member of the group with a strong interest or specialist knowledge. There is no distinction between the learners and the teachers - everyone could take a turn at being both if they wished.

NORTHWOOD AND DISTRICT U3A currently has over 700 members, and has around 50 interest groups, covering a wide range of subjects including languages, theatre and museum visits, current affairs, art and photography, walking, sports and many more. If an interest group becomes oversubscribed, a spin-off group is encouraged to form under a new leader, and similarly, members who are looking for a subject not currently available are helped to form their own interest group.

There is a monthly meeting, usually with an invited speaker, at Fairfield Hall in Northwood Hills, and each group meets either at Fairfield Hall, members'

homes or other suitable locations, as frequently as the leaders decide.




