



Business News

At VDBM, letting and managing agents based in Green Lane, we have seen unprecedented activity in the shop premises market in Northwood town centre which is good news for all and not what people would have expected in these times.

For every business that decides to close or fails there seems to be a new one willing to take on a new property and an encouraging number of entrepreneurs. The optimism around is bucking all the trends. There is optimism not only from people starting businesses but also from residents. At one point it looked as though the community would be suffering badly from a large number of empty units but now hopefully people have finally started to realise that shopping online for all goods is only destroying their own community and environment. Judging by the number of customers using Fruity Fresh for example, there seems to be a new willingness to support local businesses at last.

When we reported in the Autumn 2019 Newsletter there were a couple of shops under offer. The old kitchen showroom for example, has been progressing slowly but we are pleased to confirm that a different kitchen company should be opening there shortly.

The former Santander unit has of late been a blot on the

landscape. The tenant we had lined up for this messed about and withdrew from the transaction at the last minute. However, within a week we had re-let it and indeed have a reserve lined up should that party not proceed.

The demise of ASK, not only in Northwood but throughout the country, will be mourned by some. However, we are pleased to have been involved with the sale of the property and can reveal that it will continue to be a restaurant but in private ownership.

Even the long-empty former Jackdaw unit in Maxwell Road has finally been re-let after a couple of false starts and we are hoping that should complete shortly.

The demand we have seen in Northwood for shop premises has been replicated across other areas that we deal with in similar suburban areas such as Pinner, Eastcote and Hatch End.

On a more general note, the Government has announced the biggest overhaul of the Use Classes Order since it came into being in 1987 and this will also encourage the market. In summary, any shop unit can become a restaurant or office or healthcare facility. Fortunately, takeaways are not included on this list and still have to be applied for separately.

We hope the optimism will continue to flourish.

Business As Usual - or Not?

Surveying our shopping areas in early September it feels as though Northwood has come through the last six months pretty much intact. Most businesses have now reopened, albeit with varying levels of restriction for customers.

It is interesting to observe the different ways in which shops have overcome the challenges that have faced them by adapting their premises and working practices to safeguard both staff and customers. Many are limiting the number of customers that can be in the shop at one time, some of the smaller stores in High Street have set the limit at just two. Some have footprints and lines marked on the pavement outside to encourage people to queue sufficiently far apart. There are shops open 'by appointment only' such as Kenways and Kajal's Couture, some request you ring the bell and wait to be admitted.

Once inside a shop, you are likely to find a one-way system in place, floor markings 2m apart and plastic screens to protect the assistants.

Some businesses have been busier than ever; the Cycle Store has a waiting list for repairs and the various smaller convenience stores have come into their own – where else could you buy flour when the supermarkets had none?

One or two owners have taken advantage of the enforced closure to revamp their premises, most notably Northwood

Kebab shop on Green Lane has had a complete refurbishment and reinvented itself as Northwood Mangal.

It's good to see a few more tables and chairs outside cafés and restaurants adding to the general ambience of the town centre

A little further afield, we saw the emergence of two outdoor food markets. During the summer months, there was a fresh produce market at the Holland & Holland Shooting Ground and there is a fruit and vegetable stall on the Greene Manne car park every Wednesday and Friday.

At one stage we thought we had lost Bowley's shoe shop next to the war memorial; it looked so desolate when the parent company went into administration and it was emptied of stock. Fortunately, the company that bought Johnson's Shoes out chose Northwood Bowleys as one of the stores they wanted to retain.

With many using lockdown as an opportunity for a massive clear-out at home, it was a relief when our charity shops reopened their doors, not just because we could take our donations in, but because the lack of income has been devastating for the charities.

Northwood's businesses have shown they can adapt and survive, let's help them to flourish -

The Trust's Hillingdon buildings are in very poor condition, some of them being wartime Nissen huts, and it's very good news that plans are underway to build a new hospital on the same site. The Trust is also preparing a masterplan for the Mount Vernon site which will continue to carry out elective surgery, urgent care, blood tests, physiotherapy and diagnostics. The other organisations on the site are tenants of the Trust.

As Lead Governor at the Trust I am very much involved in the planning at both sites. Please do take part in the consultation. Traffic and Highways

NORTHWOOD TRAFFIC STUDY

As a reminder, in mid-2018 a transport study was carried out for LBH, including the following roads:

- A404 Rickmansworth Road
- B469 Green Lane between Rickmansworth Road and Maxwell Road
- Maxwell Road

You may remember that many months ago the study report was submitted to Cllr. Burrows, Cabinet Member for Planning, Transportation and Recycling, for review. So far little has been done and the project appears to be almost dormant. At my request Cllr. Lewis has asked Cllr. Burrows for an update, so far not received.

RICKMANSWORTH ROAD/GREEN LANE

Because of recent changes to double yellow lines, the number of pedestrians crossing at the junction of Rickmansworth Road and Green Lane, particularly with young children, has increased. At present, as the traffic lights now operate, there is no safe time for pedestrians to cross. Local residents have raised a petition to try to rectify this, suggesting the installation of a Pelican crossing. The council has agreed that a survey will be carried out during term time and at 'rush hour' to reflect the true usage of the crossing by the local community. This has been delayed owing to the present

restrictions, but with schools returning and traffic building, perhaps it can now go ahead.

GREEN LANE

Resurfacing of Green Lane between Hallowell Road and Rickmansworth Road has been promised for several months. Preliminary curbing work has been carried out and resurfacing is now scheduled for completion by mid-October 2020.

GENERAL



From the Treasurer

Normally in the first newsletter following the AGM I would provide some details of those approved accounts. Since Covid has prevented us from holding an AGM we have audited accounts, but they await approval by the AGM. However, the subs were marginally down compared with 2018, being £7092 compared with £7261. For reference below is a bar chart of subs for the last ten years.



Our financial year is the calendar year and sometimes subs are received in the year following that to which they refer. 2017 was a good example since some of that apparent 2017 success was due to the late 2016 receipts. Unfortunately, Covid has been problematic since it prevented our Road Stewards collecting and our subs receipts so far this year have only been around £2400. The average for the last ten years has been a smidgen under £7000 so we are a long way off that. Even now it is not easy, social distancing remains a great concern for both residents and Road Stewards so closing the gap may prove challenging, but please, if you have not paid your subs, do strive to do so. Cheques, made payable to Northwood Residents Association can be deposited at

Sharmans or Carters Chemist, either in our collection envelopes, or just write your name and address on the back of the cheque and leave it in a plain envelope marked 'for NRA'. Some Road Stewards will be collecting in person, but others may not because of their circumstances.

At the AGM I shall propose that subs remain at a minimum of £2 for residents and £10 for businesses. Many members pay £5 or more and whilst I am often asked why is the sub not £5, there is no need to mandate it if many do pay £5 or more.

Our net income over the last ten years amounts to £237. In other words, on average, each year we tend to break even. This year shows a deficit of £3087 but that is due to higher donations and the clock. The overall balance also means that our reserves remain largely unchanged, currently at £28K. It is prudent to have reserves so we can spend should an urgent requirement demand it, but they do not need to be too high. If there is anything you believe we could use some of the funds for to benefit Northwood, do please make the request. We will not spend money on items the council should cover, we will chase them to meet their responsibilities, but our objectives are to maintain the amenities of Northwood and encourage interest in the welfare of Northwood so ideas are always welcome. The physically visible NRA items are the clock, the two notice boards and some of the benches, the most recent addition being the circular bench around the tree at the junction of Green Lane and Eastbury Road.

I shall end once again by thanking our Road Stewards for their ceaseless efforts especially in these even more difficult times. If they do request subs, please make their task as easy as possible by having cheques or, ideally folding money, ready for them.

Planning Matters

It has been very busy since the last Newsletter with 185 planning applications, and I made a comment or objection on 90 of them. Most applications are for rear or side extensions and loft conversions, but there are an increasing number for works to trees covered by Tree Preservation Orders, and they accounted for 49 of the applications.

Don't forget, where an application affects your property, you should make objections or comments on the portal if there are planning reasons to do so; it is too late once consent has been granted.

You can search for a planning application using this link: http://planning.hillingdon.gov.uk/OcellaWeb/planningSearch

Just enter the first part of the address in the 'Location' box. After viewing the documents press 'Enter Comment.'

There have been some recent changes to planning law that are of significance.

From 31st August 2020 **PERMITTED DEVELOPMENT** where a full planning application is no longer required, this now covers the addition of up to two storeys to a house, whether detached, semi-detached, or terraced, and one floor on to a single storey house. These additional floors can even be flats. There are maximum heights limits relative to neighbouring properties. However, if approved they will have quite an impact on the street scene. This change applies to houses built between 1 July 1948 and 28 October 2018.

A statement must be included in the application on the impact on neighbours from overlooking or loss of privacy or light and the external appearance. Only the *adjoining* neighbours or occupiers will now be notified by the Local Authority, not even those who live opposite.

From 1st September 2020 the **USE CLASSES ORDER** has been amended. In shopping streets there is no longer the need to obtain planning permission for a change of use between shops, and banks, building societies, restaurants, cafes, indoor gyms and day nurseries, but not including takeaways, pubs, or wine bars. In the main, that will help when one tenant leaves and a new tenant takes the premises for one of the other uses.

There are also major changes to other parts of the planning system currently under consultation, for 12 weeks from 6th August 2020. This is in effect a total overhaul of the planning system and would have a major impact. The NRA will be making a submission to the consultation. For those willing to read the 84 page, 'Planning For The Future,' document, and answer 26 questions, then the link is:

- c. You may have supplied an email address in the past which was incorrectly transcribed. If you re-apply by email, I can copy/paste correctly.
- d. If there is more than one member at a residence you can supply more than one email address to receive separate notifications.

With the COVID situation being likely to worsen during the Winter months, we may not necessarily be able to print and distribute paper newsletters, but email alerts will keep you up to date.

At present we hold only about 850 email addresses from a membership of nearly 2,000 households. So, let's have a flood of new email addresses so we can stay in contact. (Each email we do send will always include an opt-out capability if you wish to discontinue).

Jean McFarlane, 1939 - 2020

Jean was a regular contributor to this newsletter and a member of the police ward panel. She made a valuable contribution to Northwood Residents' Association and often kept us on our toes. She died in April this year. Jean's close friend shares her memories:

Jean was born just two months before the outbreak of WW2, these early childhood experiences would be the catalyst which formed her jovial and sometimes outspoken community spirit. She believed community was the fabric that held us all together, that each of us played our part in supporting the greater good. Her father and Grandfather were both in the police force, so community justice became Jean's natural predisposition - from fighting to keep her local police station open to fighting with the charity RAGE.

Her strong determination culminated in the creation of her own successful business which she operated out of an office in Bond Street. Over the years she became a well-respected businesswoman working with some of the largest names in advertising and media.

Jean always loved telling stories – she was never short of material from her travels across the Middle East to her days of modelling and mixing with icons in the 60s. She also loved nothing more than spending time out in beautiful gardens in the area and was never short of a coffee date. She will be missed by not only her loved ones but by her community in Northwood.

Plans to redevelop Hillingdon Hospital

The Hillingdon Hospitals Foundation NHS Trust has announced that their redevelopment plans are now underway with their preferred option being a rebuild on the current site. As anyone who has visited the hospital will realise, the current Hillingdon Hospital is an old building - parts of the estate were built in the 1930s as emergency wartime accommodation. Some of the older wards have become unsafe and have been closed to protect patients and staff, and in total 81% of the hospital building will require major repair or replacement soon.

For patients, the maze-like layout of the current site makes it difficult to get around and the condition of buildings can make the experience of being in hospital more difficult. The site layout and state of disrepair can also make it difficult for staff to do their jobs as efficiently and effectively as they would like.

The Trust has set out a number of benefits that they feel will come from a new hospital:

- The same range of services that are currently available at the hospital, but in a high quality and purpose-built facility
- Better connectivity between departments making it easier for patients to move through the hospital
- Greater adoption of digital technologies to enhance patient care and safety
- Improved privacy with significantly more side rooms
- A more efficient building that is environmentally friendly
- Flexibility to adapt facilities in response to potential future pandemics
- Improved ability to recruit and retain a high calibre workforce
- Potential for other health and social care facilities to be provided on the site in the future to create a health and social care hub



• Sufficient capacity for the future and further expansion potential

The Trust has launched a new website dedicated to the redevelopment and is starting a community conversation to allow staff and residents to shape the emerging plans. Currently on the website you can read more detail on the plans, the process and the hopes for the future. In addition, there is an initial survey to allow you to ask questions and provide your feedback at this stage. This is also how you can sign up to the soon to be launched newsletter.

The Trust will be working with community groups, places of worship, schools and residents' associations to share information and meet more people. They are also hoping to be able to come out into the community and run events where you can see the latest plans and talk to staff, when it is safe to do so.

The plans are at an early stage but there is an ambitious timetable which would see construction starting in just a couple of years' time. It is important to note that the hospital will remain open throughout the build.

The Trust is keen to hear from as many residents as possible so if you have any views, suggestions or questions, please do get in touch with them.

A Message From Our MP, David Simmonds

When I was first elected as your Member of Parliament in December 2019, I anticipated tackling a number of challenging issues both locally and in Parliament. This was certainly the case when the country faced a nationwide lockdown and a level of disruption to our daily lives unknown in generations. These measures have meant that, regrettably, it has been necessary to curtail constituency visits. My last coffee shop surgery before restrictions were imposed was at Village Express, a long-standing business in Northwood, and I am grateful that I was able to meet with residents to discuss concerns about issues affecting the local area.

Village Express is just one of many local businesses hit by lockdown. We should not underestimate how difficult recent months have been for these businesses and how vital they will be to our local and national recovery. After the incredibly successful Eat Out to Help Out scheme, we are seeing a return to the high street and to our local businesses. Businesses old

and new, like Fruity Fresh on Green Lane – a fresh produce and juice bar and a fantastic addition to the high street, need our support. These are locally owned employers and it is essential that we support them at this time and in the weeks and months ahead.

Of local concern, I continue to follow the plans for Northwood and Pinner Cottage Hospital. In the most recent update I received from the CCG (Clinical Commissioning Group), I was pleased to be reassured that the character and tone of the hospital will be preserved. At this stage the discussions are between the care providers and the NHS Estates team. I remain committed to protecting our fantastic local care provision and I look forward to a new and improved Cottage Hospital site playing its part in that.

Another major local issue that has been placed on hold is the redevelopment of Northwood Town Centre. I know that residents were especially unhappy with the Mayor's apparent policy of removing the station car park, which seems flawed in my view. TfL has recognised that their previous development plan does not work and requires a rethink – meaning there should be no imminent planning application, which should be a temporary relief for residents. The priority should now be, particularly in light of the current circumstances, to concentrate on filling the empty shop units to help boost the local economy. I will continue to urge TfL to work with residents on this matter and will be taking up concerns alongside other MPs in affected areas.

I look forward to the hopefully near-future when I can meet with residents again in person, but please be assured that I continue serving Northwood as your MP – albeit digitally for the most part at present. A reminder that I am holding regular telephone surgeries, and if you would like to get in contact, please do so using the details in the box.


ews from the Woods

Health Matters

Covid-19

As I write in early September, the number of cases in Hillingdon is currently relatively small. As such, our rate of infection since the pandemic began is lower than many other London boroughs. However it is important to note that because of the small numbers, a few cases can change the infection rate (per 100,000 of population) quite considerably. There are several factors that can affect the number of cases including demographic profile, number of care homes, population density and other social and economic factors.

During the early stages of the pandemic, most hospitals were providing only essential services. However, slowly there is a return to normality with emphasis on preventing the spread through several safety measures. Most hospitals are now offering outpatient appointments, both face-to-face and virtual. Visitors to the hospital wards are not allowed but relatives can

communicate by online or phone communication with the patients. Blood tests, X-Rays and scan facilities have resumed.

The Minor Injuries Unit at Mount Vernon Hospital is temporarily closed. The Urgent Treatment Centre at Watford General Hospital is open from 8am to 2am every day. If anyone needs medical advice when the Urgent Treatment Centre is closed, they need to call III. The NHS III service will get them the treatment they need. In an emergency dial 999.

GP Practices, A&E, Urgent Care and Walk-in-Centres

Most GP practices in North West London are minimising face-to-face consultations. The NHS in North West London is clear that in these very challenging times it is essential that health services can be as flexible as possible to provide safe and effective care to patients, whilst protecting vital frontline staff. Some surgeries are using online E-Consult facilities. In line with all current requirements, if anyone thinks that he/she may have the symptoms of COVID-19, they are advised not to go to hospital or attend their GP. Stay at home and visit the NHS111 website for advice. **Do not attend A&E, Urgent Care or Walk-in centres.**

NHS III website: III.nhs.uk/Covid-19 can tell the individual if he/she needs medical help and advises them what to do.

The council mounted an

extensive effort to support residents and businesses, with officers doing an amazing job at sorting out any urgent problems despite having more to do but with fewer staff on hand. Essential services continued to be delivered and new services, including a community support hub were created to support residents most at risk, including those being shielded.

During lockdown there were more 'emergency contacts' via telephone to the office where people had an urgent need for support. These are usually deftly dispatched to the relevant officer by the team who take the call with us copied in on the details.

Council meetings were briefly suspended in April, but since new regulations were introduced by the government to permit virtual meetings, key meetings have been held online including full council meetings, planning and licensing committees.

We hope residents agree that, while this time has certainly been challenging, we have worked hard to keep putting our residents first, and the council has kept most services running well during this difficult time.

Playgrounds, outdoor gyms, ball courts, skateparks and tennis courts have now reopened, and signage is in place at each site to instruct users how to keep themselves and others safe. As part of the council's 2020/21 Chrysalis programme, £58,000 has been awarded to Northwood Recreation Ground for a range of improvements, including the resurfacing of the basketball area, a new basketball goal, a new outdoor gym and a pathway to link the outdoor gym and basketball area to the

Keep Your Spirits Up Do More Gardening Enhance the Environment

We are all effected by the COVID-19 Pandemic even if we appear to be well. At the very least it can dull the spirits and sap strength, physical and mental.

A pick-me-up strategy is a helpful antidote and personally speaking I advocate gardening as one form of exercise. By that I mean if you are not a gardener or leave it to others to do, get stuck in and get started. If you are presently someone that does gardening try a different tack, start with a "to do list", then prioritise that list of tasks and for the adventurous, add in goals to be achieved.

At this time of year there are always tasks to do such as weeding, cutting back bushes and hedges, mowing grass plus trimming edges. Very soon as colder weather sets in it will be time to start pruning. Advice on how to prune different types of plant or tree frequently can be found on YouTube. A simple search request such as, 'how to do xyz' or 'what type of fertilizer should be used on a abc' can often produce a good result.



While in gardening mode, don't forget to cut back boundary hedges so pavements retain their full width. And please don't allow your gardener to sweep fallen leaves into the road – far better composted or bagged for council collection than blocking the drains.

Local Policing from the NRA Police Liaison Officer

We wish Sgt Jim Last all the best in his new post. I have worked closely with Jim and he has been an excellent Sergeant always willing to listen and help. We welcome Sgt James Bishop and I look forward to meeting him shortly. Moving between posts has now become the normal situation and of course no one can begrudge officers wanting to gain promotion. That said, we should very grateful to stalwarts like PCSO John Usher who has remained with us for many years and offers a valuable stability to the community. We now have an excellent and experienced team of officers in our Safer Neighbourhood Team and we should be using their skills and knowledge to the maximum. By signing up to OWL you will gain useful insights into their work in Northwood and more importantly get advice to keep you and neighbours safe.



It will not surprise you to see that during the Covid period recent figures suggest big falls in Burglary (-83%), Robbery (-33%) and drugs offences (-33%) although theft from motor vehicles shows only a small reduction. We do have to remember that Northwood is generally a low crime area so to see such falls is even more impressive. Perhaps whilst we have been at home more, we have also considered our home and personal security as well as our online presence. I know that many people have been walking around their

neighbourhoods noticing more unusual behaviours. Also, WhatsApp and Facebook groups have appeared that not only keep neighbours connected but also advise about crime issues. Please maintain these connections for as long as possible.

As we approach winter when the longer nights usually see an increase in crime, be aware that this winter criminals may be more determined to take advantage of any lapses in your home, personal and online security. If you are concerned please contact your SNT for advice. The contact sessions with the police have been halted due to the Covid crisis but they are around and can be contacted easily.

Our Police Ward Panel has been unable to meet physically but the work continues. If you want to help us please contact me.

Together with the police we have been trying to establish a business "Shopwatch" group. The businesses seem reluctant for some reason but if you own or work in a local shop and want to get involved please get in touch with me or the police. It really would help keep the shops safe and, of course, the customers and residents of Northwood.

If you have any policing concerns please feel free to call or email me as we want to ensure our police know about and deal with the worries of our residents. And please keep abiding by the Covid rules. Keep safe and well.

Coronavirus Community Help

Northwood, Northwood Hills, Pinner, Oxhey and Ruislip

Bringing people together in our communities

The first news reports of a new strain of coronavirus reached us in January 2020. By March 2020, it was clear that the UK would not escape the ravages of a pandemic. It was also clear that many of our elderly and vulnerable neighbours would need help just to do everyday things like shopping and picking up prescriptions.

In Northwood and the surrounding areas, lots of people offered to help. Very soon, a mutual aid group was formed – Coronavirus Community Help (CCH). Within a few days, hundreds of people joined the group and a network of volunteers was soon in place. We leafletted the area and created a central administration system so that people could phone or email with requests.

At its peak, CCH had 1,000 members online and almost 200 people who volunteered to help. They have brought essential shopping to elderly residents, picked up and delivered vital

prescriptions and are even walking dogs and lending books for people who can't leave their homes.

We also managed to show our appreciation for NHS and other key workers by arranging weekly baking and snack collections for staff rooms in local hospitals, charities, supermarkets and waste centres.

The group has also procured and delivered approximately 50 carloads of food for our desperately overstretched local foodbanks. Volunteers in Eastbury and Moor Park have also coordinated donations of garden furniture and plants for care homes to brighten outdoor spaces.

Fortunately, things have quietened down with the relaxation of lockdown and the easing of social distancing. CCH wasn't intended to be a permanent organisation and is in the process of winding down its central administration.

Our volunteers will continue to help the people they are helping and we'll signpost the availability of services from established charities. In addition, many members have developed an appetite for volunteering and we've found other organisations that they can work with.

It has made for a busy year, with many of our volunteers working from home as well as helping neighbours. But it has brought many people together and helped to prove that community spirit is alive and well in Northwood.

Pharmacies and Covid-19

All pharmacies have had to adapt their working practices, here is a first-hand account from one of the NRA Business members.

Sharmans first had an extreme surge in demand for prescriptions and shop goods from around the second week of March. As the news of a possible lockdown spread, so did the panic buying of goods and ordering of prescriptions. Our team was working tirelessly from 6am until midnight, ensuring that we were still able to meet the needs of our patients and customers. This time was the busiest that we have ever been.

There were major stock shortages, not only of prescription medicines, but also for over-the-counter medicines and shop goods. We were dealing with a 3-fold increase in footfall but also desperately trying to obtain stock that was in short supply. We often had to spend hours sourcing medications and had to pay inflated prices for these. During that time, additional safety measures were introduced including protective screens for our staff, one-way flow of customers and restricted access to certain parts of the shop floor.

Once the lockdown occurred, the heightened demand for shop goods and prescriptions continued with a heavy foot-fall, causing Sharmans to strengthen measures even further to reduce the risks of transmission. We also had to suspend all our clinics including Podiatry, Osteopathy and Ear Wax removal. We found that an increasing number of shielding patients were using our delivery service not only for their

prescriptions but for shop goods. The number of deliveries increased by around 50% at this time, we had to employ extra drivers and rely on the kindness of local volunteers to meet the ever-growing delivery orders. Many GP surgeries had to reduce face to face appointments at the surgery and close their doors, this led to an increase in patients turning to the pharmacy for expert advice and treatment from our pharmacists instead.

Towards the end of April, Sharmans began to return to some state of normality. The demand for goods and prescriptions began to normalise, but we were still delivering to many patients and seeing more people consult with our pharmacists in the absence of the GP surgeries.

Towards the end of May all our clinics had restarted seeing patients face to face. We have had to put many measures in place including PPE, extra cleaning, increased intervals between patients, ventilation and adjustments to equipment. We have seen the largest number of bookings for Flu Vaccinations at the pharmacy this year and will be providing them on a safe appointment only basis.

We are slowly returning to normal or at least the 'new normal' albeit with screens, facemasks, hand sanitiser and gloves. We hope to see you all in-store soon and thank you for all your lovely messages and support that you have given during this time.

News Update from Northwood Library

All Hillingdon Libraries were closed to the public during lockdown but maintained a service to residents through provision of online resources, Home Library Service and regular Zoom meetings for specific groups.

Here in Northwood, we have been gradually increasing the services offered to residents since mid-July. For a month we delivered a successful Reserve and Collect service, where books could be ordered online or via the phone, and then handed out at the front door.



We have now taken the next tentative steps towards our New Normal. Visitors are welcome into the library for restricted browsing and for PC use. Everyone should wear a face covering if possible and should hand-sanitise on entry. PC bookings are for 45 minutes on the hour each hour, and whilst

we are unable to handle cash, we are providing five free prints per session.

Three browsers are invited in at any one time to peruse the ground floor selection of books, with one family at a time in the Children's Library. These visits are limited to 15 minutes, and we ask that any books that are touched and then not chosen are put aside to be quarantined. We can still provide non-fiction stock and books from our collection upstairs but cannot allow access to the public on the first floor.

Meanwhile, we continue to provide the full range of recycling bags to anyone with a Hillingdon First Card.

For the foreseeable future, all events and meetings in libraries are suspended, so we have had to be creative about other ways of maintaining momentum. Our social group for people living with Dementia has continued to meet via Zoom throughout Lockdown, and we plan to trial a Zoom meeting for the Northwood Library Book Group this month. Libraries across the borough will also be providing Storytimes on Zoom, so keep an eye on the Hillingdon Libraries website for details of these events.

The only other change is that our opening hours are slightly different, including a one-hour closure for lunches.

RELIGION IN A PANDEMIC

Maintaining religious practice in a pandemic is easier for some than others. Churches can move all their services online. But what about the Jewish community in Northwood? How have they maintained their religious services? Northwood is privileged to have two synagogues: the Northwood and Pinner Liberal Synagogue and the Northwood United Synagogue. The latter is somewhat more orthodox with its interpretation of the laws of the Bible, such as the law

that forbids work, and indirectly the use of electricity, on the Sabbath (Friday night to Saturday dusk). The Northwood and Pinner Liberal Synagogue has therefore been able to maintain its religious connection with its community via Zoom and live streaming for all the main services even those on the Sabbath. However, Northwood United Synagogue does not have that ability. It can stream live services only up until dusk on Friday night, then nothing more due to its interpretation and stricter observance of Sabbath rules.

The relaxation of lockdown has at least allowed for more praying in person but with social distancing, only 30 people are permitted in the synagogue. To compensate there have been many more mid-week social and cultural events run online. To ensure that each and every member can participate the community has donated ipads and IT training for those members who would otherwise not be able to connect. Authors, MPs, medical professionals and academics have all run very well-attended programmes on Zoom, helping to fill the gaps left by the lack of face-to-face activities.
