Mount Vernon Cancer Centre

The big news is that the Mount Vernon Cancer Centre will NOT be moving to Hatfield. This is really good news for local residents. We now have to work hard to make sure that the Cancer Centre stays on the Mount Vernon site and is not moved elsewhere — to Hammersmith Hospital, for example.

Patient Advice and Liaison Service (PALS)

This is a supportive service providing advice, information and on the spot help to patients, carers and relatives. Their aim is to offer prompt, confidential help and advice to resolve problems quickly relating to NHS care provided by GPs, dentists etc; to help contact other organisations that offer help; to listen to patients, carers and relatives to improve patient care; to provide information about local health service and support groups and to give guidance on how to access the NHS Complaints Procedure.

News from RAFT

It is planned that the Mount Vernon Centre will join forces with the Royal Free later this year to form a new centre of excellence, but Mount Vernon will continue with day cases and outpatient clinics for local patients.

RAFT's closeness to the Plastic Surgery Centre at Mount Vernon has always been a strength, giving research a sharp edge through the marriage of clinical work and science. That will not change, as it is planned that they will follow as soon as is feasible. This is seen as a positive move by RAFT and the research team is particularly excited since the Royal Free is the Hampstead campus of

University College London, giving access to other academic departments.

Central London Congestion Charge Extension. What you need to know for 2007

The Central London Congestion Charge western extension covers the Royal Brompton Hospital. The extension comes into effect on Monday 19 February 2007 and operates from 07:00 am to 6:30 pm, excluding Saturdays, Sundays, Bank Holidays and the three days between Christmas and New Year.

NHS patients who have a compromised immune system and who require regular therapy, assessment or recurrent surgical intervention and are clinically assessed as being too ill, weak or disabled to travel to an appointment on public transport, will be able to claim reimbursement by completing a form widely available through the hospital and having it signed by the health professional they are visiting.

Blue Badge holders will not have to pay the charge, provided they register with Transport for London and make an annual payment of £10 per vehicle. For more information visit www.cclondon.com or call 0845 900 1234.

I am writing this at the end of December, a busy time of year for most people, but made even busier for me as the NRA financial year ends on 31st December. During the last month I have banked just over 25% of the total of the year's subscriptions. This means that I have had to check and record membership

details for about 500 households in that time. I do this job very willingly, but you could all help to make it a little easier by spreading the work-load more evenly through the year:

Road Stewards, there's no need to wait until you have every last subscription in before letting me have your list and money, especially if it includes cheques that can time-out. You can collect at any time of the year, so why not start in the Spring when the evenings are lighter?

Members, if your Road Steward uses the envelope system, please help him/her by filling in your details on the front, sealing your subscription inside, and then returning it as soon as possible. By the way, our printed envelopes are not designed to be delivered by Royal Mail; it's hand delivery only.

I am pleased to report that our accounts are looking healthy. It has always been NRA policy to keep fairly high reserves for that 'rainy day' when we may need to enlist the services of a solicitor or other professional, but we do have sufficient surplus to help fund community projects. For example, this year we have made a donation to fund the tree planting at the Jubilee Playing Field. If you are involved with any project that will benefit the Northwood community, the executive committee would like to hear from you.



Rapid Growth of Business Membership

We are delighted to report that recruitment of Business Members to the Association has started well. Since the last Newsletter publication the number of Planning Applications investigated by the Association has been thirty-one with only six of these giving sufficient cause for concern for us to raise objection. Most significant amongst these was the issue of No 34 Chester Road, where application had been made for a three storey residential care home incorporating twelve single en-suite rooms. Development then proceeded without

planning permission. The Association notified the Planning Enforcement Department who in turn notified the developers that the work they were undertaking could undermine the ability to re-develop Nos 36 and 38 since this was in direct contravention of the directive given by the Adjudicator at the recent Appeals Hearing.


The Association has also been chasing the Planning Enforcement Department to halt the sale of flowers etc at the Texaco garage on Rickmansworth Road since no Planning Application for this purpose has been lodged with the Council. The Enforcement Department have apparently been told by the stall operator that they intend initiating an application in February and have consequently been allowed to continue trading! The Association finds this situation astounding when seemingly anyone can set up a stall and start trading to the detriment of honest traders who are required to pay rates and taxes! The Residents' Association had also objected to the extension of hours request for the Hand Car Wash also operating at this garage however approval for this extension has been granted by the Council.

Following the report in the June 2006 newsletter the following information regarding the New Rolling Stock Trains has been supplied by Mr G Armstrong, NRA Representative to the Met Line Users' Committee.

Last September's meeting was held at Harrow on the Hill Station and the Met Line Users' Committee was given a presentation by the LUL Upgrade Project Manager on the development of the new 'S' Stock trains, which are due to be introduced in late 2009 or early 2010.

The design is almost complete and it was reported that Customer Acceptance testing undertaken so far, based on a sample size of 427, including 58 Met Line users returned 93% either 'satisfied' or 'verv satisfied'. Some of the main issues influencing the design

and the key messages which emerged from the consultation are further explained below.

Wheelchair Access - Under present legislation there is a legal requirement to provide a minimum of three wheelchair areas per train. The new design has four. It is also a requirement to have a wide access along the whole length of the train (The door can be seen in fig 1.) This means that there is free access between the carriages, in a manner similar to the bendy-buses.

Station Dwell Times - The time taken to disembark and board passengers is the critical factor in the time a train has to remain in a station. A reduction in dwell time would allow greater train frequency. This has been researched in some depth and it has been found that gangway width is as important as width of doors. Generous circulating space in the door areas is also critical.

Train Capacity and Number of Seats - The new trains would mean a reduction of 31% seat capacity. This is of major concern to Met Line passengers who have longer journey times than those taken in the city. This reduction in seating capacity is offset, according to LUL, by increased frequency of trains to all destinations due to improved signalling, so that the number of seats per hour will remain almost at the present level. However, the new trains are expected to be introduced from late 2009, but the new signalling system will not be available until 2012. There will be an overall loss in seating capacity for almost three years. However, the new 'walk-through' layout allows passengers access to the whole length of the train to find a seat.

The provision of grab poles and rails is also an issue relating to the carriage layout. The present arrangement on Met Line trains is clearly unsatisfactory New layout showing transverse & as many passengers are not tall enough to

reach the rail above head-height when standing in the seating area. The aim in the new design is for all standing passengers to have access to a hand-hold.

Other Features - We have lost our overhead luggage racks. Apparently they are deemed to be unsafe. Instead, there is to be space for luggage under the seats and the trains are to be fully air-conditioned.
