When the new plans have been drafted, Northwood residents will be consulted before they are submitted to the council.

Traffic and Highways

RICKMANSWORTH ROAD. Resurfacing of this road between Thirlmere Gardens and Copse Wood Way was successfully completed at night over about ten days from Monday 8th August - much quicker than expected.

Around the time of this work (possibly a coincidence), the phasing of the lights on the Ducks Hill Road junction seemed to have changed, favouring the traffic exiting Ducks Hill Road, causing virtual gridlock between 8 and 9am from Northwood station and Northwood Golf Club to this junction, and probably beyond, and seriously adding to pollution levels. I reported this to the council four times and they discussed this problem with TfL, who is responsible for all traffic lights in London. Eventually I was informed that a detector loop in the highway had been damaged and that TfL intended to carry out the work to rectify the fault on Sunday 18th September. This was done, with a significant improvement in traffic flow.

The incidence of vehicles exiting The Avenue and making a U-turn around the end of the central reservation in Rickmansworth Road, to then head towards Northwood Hills, is increasing. This is a very dangerous practice and I have asked the council to install at least a "no U-turn" sign.

DENE ROAD. Electrical work was scheduled for the south end of Dene Road (close to Green Lane) to be carried out between 27th July and 2nd August. Cones, barriers and signs were erected on 27th July, the carriageway width temporarily reduced and use of local parking spaces withdrawn. There was no sign of any work being carried out up to Friday 29th July and by that time the cones, barriers and signs had been pushed to one side, whether officially or by members of the public is not known. I was able to contact the council on Monday 2nd August, only to find that they were not aware of any of this, but later a council officer called back to say that the work had been postponed and that the cones, barriers

and signs would be removed, (which happened a week later after a further 'phone call). I also contacted UK Power Networks who confirmed the above and apologized for not informing the council. Apparently their "customer was not ready" (possibly a local business) and so the job will have to be rescheduled with new permits, etc.

TRAFFIC SURVEY. Possibly good news - small plastic boxes have been appearing mounted on traffic lights and other poles over a wide area of Northwood. I understand, but not confirmed, that these have been installed by TfL to monitor traffic conditions — time will tell.

GREEN LANE. There are signs of the carriageway breaking up in a number of places. A specific problem adjacent to the pedestrian crossing close to The Glen has been identified and reported to the council. Two temporary patches have appeared.

Further to this, on Thursday 22nd September, I noticed water bubbling up through the road surface by the car park adjacent to the Dene Road junction. This was immediately reported to Affinity Water and temporary traffic lights were set up the following day, after the discovery of a burst water main. Work started a few days later, and was largely completed by Thursday 29th September. The next day the temporary lights were erected further down Green Lane (close to the LST) for work to be done on a valve and then removed that evening.

LINKSWAY. In April, National Grid Gas began pipe replacement work in Linksway, from the junction with Copse Wood Way to outside no.33 (i.e. the whole of Linksway). This work has now been completed and the area reinstated. Some of the pavements need repair work and cleaning.

New Community Noticeboard

Noticeboards have been a tried and tested way of passing on news and information. They are ubiquitous: whether indoors, in school corridors announcing exam results, staff canteens with names for the next 5-a-side game, office lobbies with health and safety pronouncements, or outdoors, at station entrances with a map of the local area; you are never far from them.

The NRA committee also recognises the value of noticeboards and has acquired another one to add to the two that are currently located in and near Waitrose. Funds for a



new one to be sited in the High Street were approved at the 2015 AGM. The NRA Executive Committee decided on its preferred location and sought approval from Hillingdon Council who then installed

the noticeboard adjacent to the bus stop outside Carter Chemist. The first set of notices went on display in June this year and since then all manner of announcements covering charity events, flower arranging demonstrations and meetings with senior personnel from the police and health bodies have been pinned up and then replaced as new ones have been sent in.

Many of the posters have been produced by graphic designers working for the organisations that want to promote their event. A great deal of thought and effort has gone into creating the artwork and text so that they grab the passerby's attention. With bold colours and graphics, they do add a splash of colour to the street scene. Next time you are going down Green Lane or waiting in the High Street for that bus that's taking ages to arrive, do have a look at the noticeboard.

All three noticeboards are available for advertising local activities and general information as long as the notices are from a non-profit making body based in or having links with Northwood. There is no charge for using this facility. So if you, or any friends or family members, belong to such an organization and wish to publicise a forthcoming event, get in touch with me. The community noticeboards belong to you — you helped to put them in place, so make the most of them.

Environment

CAN WE BE PROUD OF OUR ENVIRONMENT? Northwood has many green spaces close to and within its boundaries that help to give it a country-like appearance, yet this suburb is only a short distance from central London. But the actions of a few can spoil it for the majority. Our residents comprise home owners, apartment and flat owners, lease holders and residents in rental

accommodation. I'm sure that the majority of residents get along with one another very well, but that is not always the case; just look at the instances of household goods being dumped, or poorly parked cars that cause obstruction. If each resident thinks not just of himself or herself, but also of the community, our community, then selfish attitudes can be expected to diminish.

Many times my attention has been drawn to overhanging branches and sprouting scrubs coming from front gardens that make it difficult for pedestrians trying to walk on pavements, to verges that are left untidy or gouged by vehicle tyres, or broken paving slabs and driveways caused by contractors with heavy vehicles driving over these surfaces. All too often this happens during extension and general building work or demolition work, events that are very frequent in Northwood.

Is this right, fair or otherwise? In my opinion and the opinion of the NRA committee it is nothing more or less than antisocial behaviour - the antithesis of good community spirit.

Examples of this can be seen at many of the property building works being completed around Northwood. The work appears finished, yet immediately in front of the property the

verges have been ruined, paving is in pieces, while on the private side of the boundary all is spick and span.

On a positive note the council is taking an interest in damage avoidance to driveways and paths at construction sites. For major works, a current proposal under discussion is to require developers to install 'heavy duty cross-overs' from the outset of works and in the meantime prior to a formal decision being made, consideration is being given on how to encourage developers to install such crossovers. Whether or not this is possible via a planning condition, or at the very least, by updated planning Informatives, only time will tell.

As residents, should we look beyond the immediate boundary of our property and keep that tidy? My view is that we should do just that. To those residents in apartments that have maintenance companies keeping their grounds smart, my message is simple – please ask them to check and tidy up the outside of the property, if not already doing so.

Hillingdon Council is attentive to complaints about litter and rubbish and has the resources to clear up – but that use of operatives, materials and equipment costs us as tax payers. The council is responsive to resident reports and enquiries that subsequently require action. The Hillingdon Council website is easy to use and each general enquiry or complaint once logged is given a unique reference number which is then issued to the relevant department that will investigate and deal with the matter. So if you see something that needs council attention then please try to log your query on their web site, or let me know about it.

In the summer period NRA notified seven items to the council, five were matters of complaint, and two were improvement suggestions made by residents which reinforces the idea that Community Spirit is indeed alive in Northwood. If this is true, then, YES, WE CAN BE PROUD OF OUR NORTHWOOD ENVIRONMENT.

A Message from Nick Hurd MP ...

Some years slip quietly by. Not so 2016 which has witnessed a seismic summer in British politics. Through our votes we have all been part of a very big decision to leave the EU. We now have in effect a new Government and I was pleased to be invited by Theresa May to be Minister for Climate Change and Industry in the new Department for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy. Of course I would welcome any views from constituents, both on the course of Brexit and the responsibilities of the Department.

However demanding the new role, I am clear that my primary responsibility remains the constituency. In Northwood, my main concerns remain the same. If TfL goes ahead with the redevelopment of its large area of land in the centre of Northwood, then I want to work with residents and the council to make sure that development is appropriate for Northwood and represents a clear upgrade for the area. We saw off the first plan which was plain wrong. The second one had significantly more support but still divided opinion. As you may know, TfL has now effectively pulled its application but I expect them to come back with another one. When we see the shape of it, residents with views must not hesitate to contact me as I need to know how the community feels. My other main concern is to make sure that the shamefully

neglected Northwood and Pinner Cottage Hospital is redeveloped in a way that delivers a clear community benefit, and respects past promises to residents. With the support of Tony Ellis and the NRA, I have been pushing the NHS hard over some time and



we expect a decision soon. I will of course keep residents informed.

I remain very grateful to the Northwood Residents'

Association which works so hard on behalf of residents to protect the things that people value so highly about living and working in Northwood.

Health Matters

ROYAL BROMPTON AND HAREFIELD NHS FOUNDATION TRUST. The trust has been in the news recently over the proposed closure of its Congenital Heart Disease Services. There is no resolution of this proposal at present but on a more positive note Community Voice reports that a groundbreaking study, led by experts from Royal Brompton Hospital and the University of Oxford, has discovered better methods to interpret the significance of gene mutations in patients who are tested for genetic conditions. The findings mean that, in future, more diagnoses could be made through genetic testing.

THE HILLINGDON HOSPITALS NHS FT. Accident and Emergency Remedial Action Plan Both attendances and blue-light ambulance attendances have increased by 9% with other ambulance attendances up by 7.7%. Difficulty in achieving the four hour waiting target has been addressed jointly by the hospital and the CCG with the following introductions:

• Early senior consultant assessment.

- Two new triage rooms.
- Additional Clinical Decision Unit beds are being considered.
- A longer term solution is proposed in the "Shaping a Healthier Future" business case, which would allow the department to see 220 patients per day.

Mental Health

There has been a recent focus on Mental Health Issues. **Mental Health is often seen as a "poor relation" to Physical** Health. The Hillingdon Clinical Commissioning Group has **now given this some priority in its "Five Year Forward" view.** This requires parity of esteem for mental and physical healthcare. In 2015/16 Hillingdon CCG increased funding for mental health services by 7.8%. To achieve parity with physical health services in 2016/17 this CCG will need to invest an additional f1m in mental health services.

- ◆ a welcoming place; healthy, safe and secure
- clean and well maintained; sustainability
- conservation and heritage; community involvement
- ◆ Marketing; management



Mount Vernon Cancer Centre's Cyberknife Problems 2016

In 2010, thanks to a generous donor, Mount Vernon Cancer Centre (MVCC) was the first in the NHS to receive cyberknife, which provides targetted radiation sparing adjacent tissues.

Subsequently, other centres acquired this equipment and its use was funded by NHS England (NHSE). MVCC provided advice and tutelage to the newcomers.

In 2016 NHSE, invited applications for funding to use this equipment to treat brain metastises. Due to a trivial error in the East and North Herts. application, the MVCC application was not considered despite this error being notified to NHSE. So the 17 centres funded for this treatment from 1st September 2016 excludes MVCC, with serious consequences for MVCC and its patients.

The Community Voice, of which Northwood Residents' Association is a member, wrote to Simon Stevens, Chief Executive of NHSE asking him to intervene, quoting the following main concerns:

1. MVCC was not even considered - the application error should have been rectified.

- 2. Around a third of MVCC's cyberknife income is lost by this edict, possibly threatening use of cyberknife for other conditions.
- 3. The many patients with brain metastises not needing surgery will be seriously affected:
- a. Familiar pathways disrupted
- b. Undermining confidence built up over time with particular clinicians
- c. Unnecessary travelling to new centres
- d. Exacerbation of the stress inherent in their illness
- 4. The generosity of future donors to the NHS is threatened if this donated equipment is allowed to lie idle when it could be
- 5. We understand that treatment of metastises is best overseen by the oncologists responsible for the original tumours.

There is disbelief that having tutored many of the approved centres, MVCC is itself excluded.

Metropolitan Line

It has not been a good few months for us Met line users. Signalling problems seem a weekly occurrence and weekends are often hit too. Exasperating when you consider the years they have closed the line for 'repairs' and that the problems seem to affect the same signals. The usual excuses are trotted out - they are old and therefore it is not TfL's fault. Interesting, though, that one day ONE faulty train created a suspended service and then severe delays for SIX hours. Extraordinary. One does wonder if the whole truth is really reaching us about these delays. I have asked the question.

In this modern age it can be useful to check your 'app' or social media to see how the lines are running and make alternative arrangements. Alas, the control centre doesn't appear to tell its own team when there are issues until it is too late. Often it is when the passengers start making complaints across social media that the first sign of trouble is heard. In this day and age it seems remarkable that TfL areas struggle to give each other timely information. And then even if the driver wants to tell us it seems their PA systems

either don't work or they are not using them properly! Must try harder.

It's worth noting that TfL withdrew its latest application to redevelop the station and nearby area. The station was actually opened in 1887 (130 year anniversary next year) and rebuilt in the late 1950s/60s. So I guess a refresh is needed of sorts though I imagine the process may take as long as getting the signals fit for purpose. Incidentally despite some local urging, Night Tube



will not reach us for a number of years yet. The official reason? The signals are not fixed. It seems we have a red

light on most things Metropolitan Line wise in Northwood.

Local Policing

ROADSHOW. The Metropolitan Police Commissioner Sir Bernard Hogan-Howe held a Roadshow at Hillingdon Civic Centre on Wednesday 24th August which proved to be most interesting. It gave local people the chance to put direct questions to him; he coped very well with a range of questions. On stage with him was our new Acting Borough Commander, Chief Superintendent Colin Wingrove. I met with CS Wingrove recently and he is very keen to promote neighbourhood policing and to connect with local residents and businesses.

PERSONNEL CHANGES. There have been a number of local changes involving temporary (possibly permanent) promotions to cover hierarchical changes at the top of the Met Police. Inspector Rob Bryan is acting as T/Chief Inspector, Hillingdon Neighbourhoods and Partnership and in his place will welcome Inspector Paul Trice who will take over running Hillingdon North Safer Neighbourhoods.

MORE DEDICATED OFFICERS. The Mayor of London, Sadiq Khan, and the Commissioner, Sir Bernard Hogan-Howe have agreed to introduce a second Dedicated Ward Officer (DWO) in every London ward by the end of 2017. This is an increase of over 500 officers who are dedicated to wards across London and ring-fenced, with a sole focus on responding to the issues that matter to that local community. These officers will come from existing officer strength on the Borough.

The first 260 officers will be moved into the role by the end of this year with the remainder in place by the end of 2017. Locally, we will increase DWO numbers by phasing in an extra eight officers on Hillingdon borough. The wards that are being enhanced in the first phase (by the end of 2016) include Northwood Hills but not Northwood although the two teams work very closely anyway.

SAFETY FOR THE WINTER. As we approach winter and the darker evenings now is a great time to consider the security of your property and person. Burglary has pleasingly fallen over the summer months and we want to keep it that way. The run up to the festive season does, however, tend see an increase in burglary so start considering property security now

There is a huge amount of safety information on the Police website and our local officers are happy to discuss security with you personally. They can even make an appointment to visit you. Or see PC David Bell and PCSO John Usher at our Police surgeries.

GET CONNECTED. By joining our joint database Police issues affecting you and the community can be addressed quickly and efficiently. This is the easiest and quickest way to know what is happening in Northwood and our local Safer Neighbourhoods Team (SNT) is keen to keep you informed about current issues by sending details directly to your inbox.

There will continue to be opportunities to meet the Police at either Waitrose or under the gazebo on Green Lane outside Costa. Our website and information boards give details of dates and times.

NORTHWOOD POLICE WARD PANEL. During our recent summer meeting we again had a packed agenda. Local issues discussed included a rise in speeding complaints, inconsiderate parking at schools and town centre, thefts from shops, new connections with faith groups, re-assuring the community after the summer attacks in France and Belgium, some anti-social behaviour and much more. Minutes of our meetings are held at Northwood Library.

BUSINESS FORUM. George Perdios of Beyond Kitchens is our ward panel business liaison member and continues to provide good insight into issues concerning Northwood businesses. A few businesses continue to suffer from theft but the local Police are working closely with all businesses to provide security advice. SPEEDING. I think speeding is a subject I write about in every newsletter. Over the summer it has become the most frequent reason for people to contact us. Sadly, the speeding locally is getting much worse and we may need to take drastic action to reduce it. Surely our community doesn't want speed tables, speed cameras or even worse a fatality? Those speeding are mainly locals and of all age groups; it's not just people in fast cars or young drivers. Our research shows it to be a far-ranging problem. The police are helping us to address this problem so if you are speeding there is now a better chance you will get caught.

It is clear that the 30mph or 40mph limit on local roads is being blatantly flouted. The speed limit is set for a reason and drivers in today's modern vehicles can easily accelerate beyond it in a matter of seconds. Perhaps speedometers, which are an integral part of the dashboard, are not being used. Please check how 30mph feels next time you drive.

All of us have families out on the streets; surely speeding is a risk that is not worth taking.

If you are concerned about speeding cars or those being driven erratically the police advice is to note the registration number of the vehicle and, if possible, its make and colour. Persistent offenders will eventually be caught and possibly fined. Section 59 warning letters may be issued by the police, meaning that if speedsters are seen or reported repeatedly a vehicle can be seized.

That information can be sent to me or directly to the SNT. Your messages will be kept confidential.

Inconsiderate parking is another issue being mentioned a lot. We hope that cameras being placed outside schools will discourage bad parking at the school gates but often inconsiderate parking is also seen in and around our town centre and shopping areas.

SCHOOLS AND YOUTH CLUBS. Another of our important missions is to connect with the youth who live and study in Northwood. There is so much value in learning about personal safety, online scams, reporting abusive behaviour and other issues that affect the younger generation.

We currently have a vacancy on the ward panel for a 16-25 year old who wants to represent their community. Please contact me or the SNT if you want to volunteer.

Northwood Police Station is open - just. Volunteers are desperately needed to help man the front desk for a few hours a week. Our current volunteers do an excellent job for the community but we need more people. For details contact:

Our Local Councillor's Responsibilities - Scott tells all

As well as representing the great residents of Northwood each and expert witnesses to provide and every day, when working at the Council's Civic Centre, I undertake two key roles supporting Hillingdon's democratic and governance arrangements.

The first is Chairman of the Corporate Services & Partnerships Policy Overview Committee. A long title, I admit, but essentially I oversee a team of councillors who monitor and develop new proposals for service improvement, reporting to the Cabinet members who make the decisions. My committee covers a broad array of council services

provided mainly by the Council's Administration and Finance Directorates. These include strategic policy and internal functions such as finance, property, partnerships, personnel, democratic services, legal services, ICT and economic development.

A statutory role the committee plays is providing comment and input on the annual budget process and key policies prior to decision by the Cabinet and Full Council. We also usually undertake two proactive policy reviews each year looking at council services. We are currently mid-way through one looking into the recruitment experience for those wishing to work at Hillingdon.

All our meetings are open to residents to attend and listen. We also directly invite service users, local organisations

evidence and information for our reviews to add real insight and value.

My other role is Vice-Chairman of the Audit Committee, similar to such bodies in the private sector. Here I work closely with both Councillors and Officers to oversee the council's audit, governance and risk management frameworks, providing that all important independent assurance

mechanism. We also oversee the financial reporting process of the Council's Statement of Accounts each year.

From the NRA Treasurer

END OF NRA YEAR LOOMS. The unusually warm September broke numerous records but autumn appears to be here and with it the October newsletter. This is the last one for 2016 so I feel obliged to remind everyone that the NRA financial year ends on the 31st December, please do get the subs in prior to that. I would now normally provide some statistics on the many members who pay much higher subs than our current minimum, but the fact that around 50% do so is already well known.

LBH STATS. However, I have received requests from members to add numbers from London Borough of Hillingdon (LBH). Their website does have some interesting items for example the empty property discount rules changed on 1st April. In some circumstances this means that owners of empty houses will pay full rates in future. Now the NRA is apolitical as is this article so I will not comment on whether that makes sense or not. Some boroughs claim they are blighted by investors acquiring residential property which is left empty purely to make money when sold due to house

price inflation and currency speculation. Whether having to pay rates will have an impact on that problem remains to be seen. Given the sums involved, it may not stop the practice, but even if it does, at least councils will gain some revenue.

There are three LBH pensioners aged over 100, 154 are over 90. At the other extreme, there are 123 active members of the pension scheme aged 16 to 20 inclusive. Just to be clear, that is ex staff and current staff of LBH, not the population at large.

Parking provides another interesting number: in 2014/15 Hillingdon spent £2.7m on activities that raised just over £4m income, a surplus of £1.3m. The majority of the income, £3m, was from penalty notices. Around £1m of the surplus was spent, £20,300 of it on CCTV.

Back to the NRA, I hope for a good last quarter of 2016, with the subs flowing in abundance.

Hillingdon Neighbourhood Watch (HNW)

Hillingdon Neighbourhood Watch (HNW) was established in the 1990s to bring neighbours together in order to create strong, active communities where crime and anti-social behaviour are reduced. The aim is to help residents to protect themselves and their properties in order to reduce crime and the fear of crime.

These aims are achieved by the creation of street and road schemes known as Watches, run by a volunteer co-ordinator or joint co-ordinators. The role of the co-ordinator is really down to what the volunteer wishes it to be, the main undertaking being to deliver HNW's monthly newsletter to all members of the Watch (all residents) and to provide crime prevention information, for which a comprehensive handbook is provided.

In recent years, throughout Hillingdon, many of the original co-ordinators and deputies have retired owing to the problems associated with advancing years, Northwood being no exception. Earlier this year the former Borough Commander initiated a recruitment drive spearheaded by the SNTs, thus reviving the partnership between HNW and police which existed some years ago. Whilst Northwood SNT has been very successful in finding volunteers to start new Watches or revive those declared dormant, there are still significant areas in the ward without Watch coverage. Long roads in excess of 75-100 homes can be split into smaller watches, thus giving the volunteer(s) a manageable workload.



Cuts for the Woods



Hillingdon, like all councils, has suffered budget cuts; funds for the woods have been reduced. The budget to look after Ruislip Woods has been cut by a third. However, this has helped the Woods Rangers target their efforts to the most vital areas. Some of the planned coppicing will be redirected to specific areas mainly to benefit the local wildlife. Resources will also focus on maintaining and widening the pathways to create 'Gateways for Wildlife' and make access to the woods easier for the public.

The efforts to control Himalayan Balsam have not worked and you will find areas of this, albeit very attractive plant, still spreading in the woods. Himalayan Balsam is undesirable because it spreads so rapidly, blotting out all other plants, and it is not easy to kill. Each plant, and every bit of its root system, has to be dug up or it will return like Ground Elder. You cannot spray it in woodland for fear of killing everything else around it.

Finally, it will soon be time for the cows to leave Poors' Field and return to their farm for winter. Sadly, one of them was taken ill recently and was found by a member of the public lying under a bramble bush. The farmer came and took her away.




