TRAFFIC

STATION DEVELOPMENT

There has been no progress since the last newsletter. The following statement was received from Transport for London on 23rd January 2018:

"We are on track to select a development partner for Northwood station within the next few months. Once appointed we will work with the partner to bring forward new proposals for the station, which will be subject to local consultation and engagement. We want to thank everybody for their patience while we choose a development partner. We are looking forward to working with the local community to bring forward new proposals for the site."


Recently the Mayor for London has decreed that 35% of all developments must comprise affordable homes so this will, no doubt, impinge on the design.

Traffic and Highways

NORTHWOOD TRAFFIC STUDY

We have had confirmation that LBH will carry out a transport study for the following roads:

- A404 Rickmansworth Road
- B469 Green Lane between Rickmansworth Road and Maxwell Road
- Maxwell Road

I understand that the study is likely to last for a full week, during school term, in March or April 2018. Among other things, consideration will be given to traffic speeds and parking.

GREEN LANE

About 18 months ago, it was noted that after heavy rain the pedestrian crossing near The Glen becomes flooded and unusable, with pedestrians being sprayed with water by passing traffic. Although this was reported to the council at the time, and on many occasions since, the problem hasn't been solved.

Recently a council officer spoke to the drainage contractors who said that they attended the site on 2nd February and checked the gullies between Welcote Drive and Wilford Close. The gullies and their connections were jetted. However, upon lifting a number of the manhole covers on the footway either side of the road, the drainage pipes were found to be blocked.

This has been reported to Thames Water (TW), together with the background information from my initial enquiry, plus the photos I provided. TW has been asked to arrange for an engineer to attend the site as soon as possible, with a view to arranging a line clean – hopefully sooner rather than later.



NORTHGATE

You drive into Northgate from Ducks Hill Road at your own risk; the camera at this junction is now live.

SANDY LODGE WAY / DENE ROAD

An independent 24 hour / 7 day speed survey has been completed at three locations on these two roads. Detailed results are now available and show that the majority of vehicles were travelling between 20 and 30 mph, a few exceeding 50 mph and three were measured at 60-100 mph. LBH have commented that "These results unfortunately do not give the council sufficient evidence to justify further investigations into physical traffic calming measures in Sandy Lodge Waye(sic) or Dene Road, Northwood at this time". Although I understand that in March 2013 an elderly resident was knocked down in Dene Road and subsequently died, the police apparently have no record of this.

RTHWOOD

Metropolitan Line

It was very disappointing to see that the Met Line extension (CROXLEY LINK) which looked to benefit many people seems to have been shelved. The original plan was that TfL would contribute about £49m to the scheme; the Government and others would fund the rest. A recent review showed there was a funding gap of £73m. However, after a series of meetings the Government agreed to fund this gap. Alas, at this stage Mayor Khan decided not to honour the agreement to put in the original TfL £49m. This looks like it could be the end of the road (track). The scheme would clearly have benefitted many commuters and residents, from Watford, South Herts and North West London. Despite this not being a political scheme (supported by many MPs across the political divide) the fact that it benefits those not in the Mayor's voting sight may, I guess, have something to do with the change of heart. Let's hope common sense prevails.

Meanwhile, we poor Met line users had a bit of a torrid time over the winter months with what felt like daily troubles on the line. The usual reasons (that signal at Finchley Road has a lot to answer for!) and the usual long lead time to fix issues with communication being somewhat shoddy given what should be possible in this day and age made for many perfect storms. Indeed, it is worth checking Twitter as many commuters tend to update you well ahead of TfL. So bad were the problems at one point that there was talk of a protest by quite a few regular commuters. This seems to have



A Message from Nick Hurd MP

The Northwood Residents' Association, not least your Chairman Tony Ellis, has been a staunch ally in the long campaign to bring the **NORTHWOOD AND PINNER COTTAGE HOSPITAL** back into life as an asset for the community.

Things were looking bad for a while. It was clear that the NHS didn't care about the site anymore and the dilapidation of this once proud building was very depressing. Promises were made by people, now long since moved on, but nothing seemed to happen. Then the NHS declared it surplus to requirements and a decision was taken to sell it. My concern, shared by many, was that if we did nothing all we would get was more high-priced flats. So, for some time now, we have put pressure on the NHS to remember past promises that the war memorial would be respected and that any redevelopment would deliver some community health benefit.

I AM PLEASED TO REPORT SOME PROGRESS. NHS Estates have confirmed to me that their Plan A is to do a redevelopment that combines two things. First, they want to upgrade the Northwood Health Centre and physically move it into the main hospital building. In that process, the commitment is to preserve the historic facade of the main building and the war memorial. Secondly, they want to redevelop the rest of the site, including the old Health Centre site, for accommodation. I have pressed them for years to consider a mix that includes additional sheltered or extracare accommodation, given the demographics that suggest that we will need more of that type of accommodation. They are open to this, not least as the market is increasingly wanting this and that is reflected in valuations that developers are prepared to pay.

The NHS is not just talking about it now; I am at last seeing some action. They have engaged with the Health Centre GP practices, who themselves are keen to upgrade their offer to

residents, and I hear those conversations have been constructive. Early conversations are taking place with Hillingdon Planning, who I am sure will want to feel comfortable that the accommodation is suitable in scale and quality for the area. An



important issue to be resolved is the position of the Hillingdon CCG who, as local health care commissioners, need to approve the project. They have assured me that they are supportive in principle. In fact, the issue now in their mind is whether they should commission extra services on the site as part of their plans to develop a new "hub" of primary care services in the North of the Borough. Hopefully this will be resolved in the coming months, and a planning application will be forthcoming before the summer.

THE COMMUNITY RAISED THE FUNDS FOR THE ORIGINAL HOSPITAL. It is part of the local fabric and thanks to our collective efforts, the NHS is well aware that they need to get this right, or risk "unleashing hell!" We were promised that the site would continue to deliver health services to the community and that promise needs to be kept.

What do you think about the future of the Cottage Hospital site? Be sure to let Nick Hurd MP know.

From the Treasurer

ANOTHER YEAR ENDS and with it another financial year. Thank you to all members for continuing their support and thank you to the Road Stewards and Area Road Stewards who collect the subs and deliver the newsletters. The accounts have not been finalised and audited as yet, they will be prior to the AGM. The subs total is high, in part due to some late 2016 submissions that are included in 2017, but even allowing for that, a good year. If you have not paid your 2017 subs yet, there is still time to do so and they can be included in the 2017 accounts. If the accounts have been passed to our auditor, any submissions after that will appear in the 2018 accounts but be recorded in the membership database correctly for 2017.

THE YEAR IN QUESTION. We are often asked why we collect during the year of membership and not for the following year. I do not actually know, I suspect there is some historical rationale that would explain it, but as we pay the subs only once a year, it makes little difference to us individually. Legally of course, we do require a financial year and ideally all income and expenditure would be included in the year in which it occurred. That also enables year-on-year analysis to be completed.

OUR LARGEST EXPENSE is for printing. £4,101 was spent on it in 2017, the vast majority being the production of the newsletters. These are now full colour and I believe a very good product. Around 2,600 are printed three times a year. Apart from the website they are the most visible, tangible product of the NRA. Much work is not visible, the neverending work around planning; chasing the council to fix the roads and pavements, or to clear rubbish; liaising with multiple stakeholders and organisations... The newsletters themselves consume hundreds of hours of work. The articles have to be written, Ros, our editor, has to edit the articles and piece them together to build the pages ready for the printers to print them. The delivery of many heavy boxes then has to be split amongst the ARSs and RSs for delivery to the members.

So, as I often plead, please make the life of the Stewards as easy as possible by having subs ready, either cash, ideally folding money, or cheques payable to 'Northwood Residents Association'.

OPINION

Housing, Green Belt and Skyscrapers

You will be familiar with the ongoing debate around the urgent need, nationally, for housing and, in particular, the 'affordable' variety. The perceived wisdom appears to view the problem mainly as one of inadequate supply, although there is an argument that over the past ten years population explosion and extremely low interest rates have fuelled demand. Such demand factors have political, social and economic implications that are difficult to resolve. For example, large population increases also stimulate land requirement for infrastructure (roads, schools, hospitals, etc) as well as housing. The UK population is predicted to increase by 3.6 million by mid-2026, pass 70 million by 2029 and be 72.9 million in mid-2041 (Office for National Statistics).

FROM RENTING TO HOME-OWNING AND BACK AGAIN.

At the turn of the twentieth century, we were a nation of 'renters'; just 10% of the population owned their own home. Home-ownership increased to 70.9% in 2003, but has since steadily declined to 62.9% and is still falling.

Nowadays, the main barrier to home ownership is 'affordability', especially in London and the south east. The **average** cost of a three-bedroom semi in the London Borough of Kensington & Chelsea is an eye-watering £6m+; the most expensive real estate on the planet, second only to Monaco. Fifty years ago, an average three-bedroom semi and a four-bedroom detached house in Northwood could be bought for £7,000 and £10,000 respectively. Today, we are into the realms of monopoly money, when those same properties are circa £700,000 and £1m (a multiple of 100!).

A GROUP OF PEOPLE HAS EMERGED KNOWN AS

'GENERATION RENT'; 24-35 year-olds struggling to get on to the housing ladder and prepared to spend up to 50% of their net take-home pay in rent. Many are still living with their parents at age 35. A little more than a generation ago, 24 year-olds were finding a deposit, funding the mortgage

and purchasing their first home. Today, that first rung on the ladder for, say, a one-bedroom flat in Northwood might require a deposit of £30,000 and a mortgage of £270,000; often an almost impossible equation for a young couple. Hence the phenomenon of 'the bank of mum and dad and/or grandma and grandpa' helping their offspring with the deposit and/or guaranteeing the mortgage.

The hunger for home-ownership continues unabated and part of the solution, now encouraged by Government, is the acceleration of public and private housebuilding programmes for homes to purchase or rent. Currently, both are woefully inadequate. The latest statistics show 217,000 new homes built in 2016/17, whereas 400,000 per annum are needed to have any significant impact. To some extent, our slow and ponderous planning system is guilty of delaying and frustrating this process. Although just 13% of the land area of England, the green belt is regarded as sacrosanct, by Government, Local Authorities and home-owners alike and the lobby to preserve it is very powerful indeed. Likewise, high-rise buildings generate massive local protest.

We all wish to live amongst open spaces and who wants to look out of their window at a multi-storey block of flats? Yet, logically, where is the land to build all these new homes and related infrastructure and are incursions into the Green Belt and skyscrapers inevitable if the housing needs of present and future generations are to be satisfied? In time, we might all have to get used to the idea!

Dear Local Councillors

Email:

Each newsletter usually carries an item from our councillors, the topic being suggested by the NRA committee. This time, we wrote an open letter to the councillors. Cllr Seaman-Digby advised us that in order to give "the fullest and most informative response", he will require input from council officers at a detailed level. This will take some time, so we plan to publish the full response in the Summer newsletter. In the meantime, here is the open letter:

Dear Councillors

Over the last few years, parts of Northwood have developed into a building site. We have seen houses in Ducks Hill Road demolished to make way for large blocks of flats, destruction of attractive 1930s houses in Copse Wood to be replaced by ugly mansions, conversion of houses into flats in Old Northwood and the extension or redevelopment of established houses. All of these developments bring noise, dirt, inconvenience and traffic problems for neighbours. Whilst a few contractors are considerate, the majority seem to have no respect for the local population. Some contractors work only intermittently, have no regard to safety and work out of permitted hours. The latter extend the development work far beyond what is reasonable.

For example:

- The appearance of the Copse Wood estate has been largely disfigured with bulky edifices and many mature trees have been lost. Pavements have been blocked during construction, destroyed and not replaced.
- The contractor on the development on Rickmansworth Road opposite Hills Lane leaves mud on the road and lets vehicles enter and leave without proper supervision.

Four of the six houses between 13 and 29 Kewferry Road have been/are being totally redeveloped in the last three years, all of them taking over a year. At one time three were being worked on at the same time. Neighbours have had enjoyment of their gardens blighted by the noise of machinery and men shouting, burning rubbish in back gardens, constant movement of skip lorries and heavy vehicles and once, 13 contractors' vehicles were parked in the street at one time causing traffic chaos. All of the paving slabs have been broken.

Whilst we don't want to stop development, Northwood residents should not be subjected to such inconvenience and inconsideration. What steps can you take to ensure Hillingdon Council mitigates the effects of development, makes sure that replacement buildings are more sympathetic with their surroundings, stops the loss of trees and ensures that each development is finished in a timely manner?

Are Petitions a Waste of our Time?

In June last year, a petition signed by a number of Kewferry Road residents was presented to Cllr Keith Burrows, cabinet member responsible for petitions. The petition requested reducing the volume of traffic in the road, in particular stopping HGVs and coaches using it as a short cut. The existing signs and humps do not deter them and residents are suffering from noise, vibration, pollution and frequent traffic jams. School traffic exacerbates the problem. The 20mph limit is ignored much of the time.

Our petition also has the support of Holy Trinity School, whose playground is next to the end of the road, where traffic has to stop and wait to turn in to Rickmansworth

Road, with their engines running and polluting the air. This pollution is detrimental to the health of pupils.

We suggested a width restriction at the Batchworth Lane end of Kewferry Road as such measures are successfully used throughout the borough.

When we left the meeting last June, we felt quite confident that our hearing went well.

We have recently received a very disappointing, very general letter, turning down our application. The council stated that as only 50 large vehicles were using Kewferry Road daily, it wasn't a significant problem. They also stated that Hertfordshire Council would not permit restricting traffic at their end of Kewferry Road. None of our other concerns were mentioned!

No attempt has been made by Hillingdon Council to consult us apart from this abrupt communication. 50 HGVs and coaches a day is 50 too many! We have now appealed to Councillor Burrows to reconsider but do not hold out much hope.

A futile exercise indeed.

Honour for NRA Member

Congratulations to Jan Sutton who was awarded the British Empire Medal in The Queen's New Year Honours List for services to the NHS.

Jan spent her professional life working for the NHS and is now chairman of the Mount Vernon Comforts Fund, a charity whose 150 volunteers raise over £70,000 a year to improve patient comfort at the hospital.

Jan will be presented with her medal at the Tower of London by the Lord Lieutenant of London in April. Well done, Jan!

A Slippery Slope - What Banking?

It was with sadness that we heard about the intended closure of the NatWest Branch in Northwood (also in Pinner and Hatch End) now scheduled over June and July 2018.

Many banks have been publicising their branch closure plans, usually in the light of protestations about saving money whilst also mentioning how easy it might be for residents and businesses to go to the next nearest town to seek out their branch of the bank, or alternatively, to use their local post office for basic banking activities.

In the case of NatWest Northwood, branch banking facilities will continue to be offered in Eastcote. Maybe some Northwood residents might prefer to use Harrow, Watford or Ruislip branches, or even Rickmansworth. I very much doubt that users of NatWest Northwood would find it convenient to use any branch that is not in their own town, but then not all retail banks are necessarily considered a service to and for their local community. Given that the Northwood branch of NatWest is frequently busy with people interested in using their services, it is somewhat confounding to understand the rationale behind such closure decisions. Perhaps it has more to do with premises lease renewal or national retail banking profits?

orthwood Nostalgia, Part 2

During Winter-time in the 1950s I used to get to Merchant Taylors school by Met line train to Moor Park and Sandy Lodge Halt station – shortly to be renamed simply Moor Park. There were then only two tracks, which accommodated both electric Met Line and longer-distance steam-engined trains.

The two platforms were wooden, gas-lit, one either side of the tracks, with a footbridge across to the Sandy Lodge and booking hall side, from whence a muddy track led down towards the gates, and the nearly one mile trek up the drive to school. No car park for Senior boys to drive themselves to school in those days, though this was a privilege allowed to the Head Monitor, who also was allowed to have a moustache and beard if he so wished!

The Met Line trains were not as today; they were brown carriages, either diesel or steam-engine drawn, without a connecting corridor between individual compartments. Each compartment had a door which could only be opened from inside on reaching the station by lowering the window on a huge leather strap and reaching down to the single external brass handle.

There were two particular long-distance steam trains – the Master Cutler and the South Yorkshireman. A key duty of the station staff was to evacuate both platforms of passengers well before these trains thundered through in either direction, shaking the wooden platforms to their foundations.

A bit more nostalgia next time.

NRA Health

I am delighted to take on the portfolio of Health and thank all the members of the committee for the appointment. I shall endeavor to keep you all in touch with health-related matters in Northwood.

THE CONFEDERATION OF GP PRACTICES IN

HILLINGDON. A confederation of 46 GP Practices will now serve the residents of Hillingdon by combining facilities and resources to provide more comprehensive services:

- → Extended Access Hubs will be provided at Eastcote, Uxbridge and HESA (Hayes) so that GPs can be seen, additionally, between 6:30pm-8:00pm. Appointments need to be booked.
- → Integrated Paediatric Clinic. Paediatricians can be consulted in GP Practices, avoiding the need to go to hospital.
- → Care Home Pilot Service will support residents in care homes and sheltered housing.
- → Plans are in the pipeline to have Pharmacists in GP Surgeries for consultation as well as home visits.

RESIDENTS OF HILLINGDON, in the main, attend Hillingdon Hospital, Mount Vernon Hospital, Watford Hospital and Northwick Park Hospital. 90% of residents go to Hillingdon Hospital when needed. Problems occasionally arise in the delay in discharge letters reaching the GP thus causing a discrepancy in the patient's current and previous medication. On discharge from hospital patients should take a copy of the discharge medication to their GP surgery as soon as possible and ensure that amendments to their medication are logged on their records.

CARE CONNECTION TEAMS at GP Practices connect health and social needs and provide standard support in the community. In Hillingdon the system is quite advanced compared with other boroughs. Some of the social care is not free and has to be paid for.

ONLINE CONNECTION with your GP Practice. You can register with your own practice for on-line facilities, which makes life a lot easier, saves time and stress. Patients can:

- → Book appointments
- ightarrow See their own blood test results
- → Request REPEAT MEDICATION which can be delivered to their homes if requested.

JOINT STRATEGIC NEEDS ASSESSMENT conducted by Hillingdon Health and Wellbeing Board, published in December 2015, found the following for Hillingdon residents:

- Overall the health of Hillingdon residents is good compared to England on average
- Life expectancy is higher
- Hospital stays related to alcohol and self-harm are lower
- There are higher levels of breast-feeding and less smoking at time of baby delivery
- Fewer people killed or seriously injured on roads
- Lower long-term unemployment
- Less homelessness

BUT there are challenges too

- Higher levels of violent crime
- Higher rates of sexually transmitted infections, tuberculosis and diabetes
- Fewer physically active adults
- More Year 6 children are obese
- The biggest causes of death are heart disease and stroke, cancer, respiratory diseases and diabetes.

TOTAL POLICING

From Inspector Rob Bryan

Hello again everyone. In the last newsletter I wrote about the changes taking place in local policing. Those changes have rumbled on and there are still more to tell you about, a lot of it positive. To begin with, your sergeant for Northwood remains Sam Quinn which is great for continuity - I am sure you have seen many sergeants and inspectors come and go over the years. All of our officers now have laptops or tablets which means that the walk or drive back to a police station to write up reports is no longer necessary. This in turn keeps them out in the community for longer.



WHICH POLICE BUILDINGS WE KEEP has also been confirmed and it is better news than expected. Hayes will continue to be the main patrol base for our response officers and the 24/7 front counter has been moved to there. Ruislip Police Station is being kept which was a welcome surprise. Our excellent volunteers open it most days and we have also added weekly contact points at the station when you can see a police officer should you need to report anything. The contact point times are Wednesday 5pm-6pm and Saturday 2pm-3pm. Uxbridge Police Station is still scheduled to be sold in the next few years but is currently subject to some discussion with Hillingdon Council over whether they will purchase it for continued use as a station. Watch this space. Northwood Police Station will, unfortunately, still go in the next few years.

CHANGES TO OUR MANAGEMENT AND SUPERVISION STRUCTURE are next on the cards. We have to reduce our spending whilst trying to maintain officer numbers and this will be done by reducing bosses. This will have little impact on what you see locally but the managers who are left will have to do things differently. Currently, I manage the nine wards in Hillingdon north of the A40 and two other inspectors look after the other 13 wards. From June, this will reduce to one inspector covering the whole of Hillingdon. I am happy to report that the one inspector will be me, but as a result of the increased workload the little things will change and the most obvious will be that these local newsletter pieces will be written by your sergeant in the future. I promise not to withdraw to an ivory tower, but our sergeants will take over that local engagement task.

If you have a moped, please keep reading. In Hillingdon stealing mopeds and motorbikes is on the increase. Please do everything you can to make your bike a less appealing target. Use a cover to mask the type of bike you have. Use a disc lock to stop your bike being wheeled away. Lock your back wheel to street furniture. Don't let your locks rest on the ground - this makes them susceptible to an angle grinder.

ACCIDENTS AWAITED AT ZEBRA CROSSINGS!

school we were taught how to use zebra crossings. Remember the Green Cross Code? However, there is research that indicates many if not most people have forgotten the rules. In a survey on the subject undertaken elsewhere in the UK nearly 20% of the respondents reported near misses at these crossings and 50% of respondents incorrectly stated that vehicles must stop when a pedestrian is waiting at a crossing.

Just 19% knew that it is only once a pedestrian has stepped onto a crossing that a vehicle is obliged legally to stop. Where there is an island waiting area in the middle then the pedestrian should wait there and treat the second half of the road crossing as a separate zebra crossing.

All too frequently some adults, teenagers, even children walk towards a crossing or turn from the pavement directly to the crossing and then cross without either looking or waiting for motorists to slow down and stop safely. Some of the worst offenders are those that saunter across a zebra crossing engrossed in conversation or using a mobile phone. This is simply dangerous.

The correct procedure is to reach the zebra crossing, then to stop on the pavement by its edge and look right then left very obviously, so that oncoming drivers and riders can see

you and stop safely. The pedestrian should wait for vehicles to stop before using the crossing.

I have seen several near misses, but two incidents are of particular note: first, a sauntering pedestrian pushing a pram suddenly turns and starts to use the crossing without regard to approaching vehicles. The pram and assumed on-board baby were almost hit. Second, school aged youngsters sauntering slowly over a crossing chattering, the first vehicle stopped but the youngsters forgot that a second lane of traffic was normal at that particular crossing and there was almost an accident. This inattention to oncoming traffic is a recipe for disaster, an accident waiting to happen, all because stopping at the pavement edge, using eyes and waiting until vehicles have stopped seems to have been forgotten.


Northwood is not exempt from this creeping malaise. So everyone, it is time to wake-up. Whatever your age, young or old, using a pedestrian crossing correctly helps to save lives and limbs!

Local Policing from the NRA Police Liaison Officer

As Insp Rob Bryan has advised in his article, the upheaval at the top end of the Police should not have any real effect on our local service. That said we are moving to a Tri Borough system very shortly and resources could be stretched. It will take some time for the new system to bed in and it is hoped that performance and functionality will be reviewed constantly to ensure best practice for residents. I will try to keep you updated as these changes take effect.

Locally, crime remains low but we should not be complacent. We must all do our best to be vigilant. I am still surprised when residents contact me to say they were burgled but didn't report it to the police. In fact, we must report everything that happens locally to safeguard local police resources; therefore, please ensure you report anything suspicious. For example, people or vehicles that are unfamiliar or do not fit in with your usual traffic. Don't assume workmen are genuinely working nearby. Thefts from work vans are also a concern so ensure you advise your workmen of this.

Our local police are always happy to meet and discuss personal and home security and there are a myriad of opportunities to seek help and advice. They hold crime prevention sessions at Waitrose and Costa Coffee.

Additionally, we now have two one-hour weekly contact sessions at Northwood Police station. Please check our noticeboards, website or ask the Police for dates and times. They can be found on Twitter too.

As Spring and Summer approach now is a good time to look at your sheds, outbuildings and garages to ensure they are secure and also time to think about bicycle security as well as for motor bikes.

Our volunteers continue to offer a limited but useful service at Northwood police station although this will depend on their availability.





Northwood & District Community Association is 70 Years Old!



Yes, we have been in existence for 70 years and I have been ferreting through old paperwork. In 1948 we had 186 members paying an annual membership fee of 2/6d (about £7.50 in today's money). Now our 270 members pay an annual fee of £5 so we are still good value for money. Activities included: whist drives, sewing, gramophone, discussion, drama, table tennis, modern dancing, tennis, old time dancing, young people and women's sections. Some

have stood the test of time and although we did have a play reading group and a music and jazz appreciation in the last 20 years, the table tennis, tennis and whist are the sole survivors of the original cast!

The main aim at that time was to raise funds to build or buy a building to house these activities, i.e. a community centre, but then, as now, finding land and a suitable building was both difficult and beyond funds, so this ambition was never attained. We did have a part of the Frithwood School offered to us in 1979, and we were there until the 1990s when we had to vacate the premises due to the demand for more classrooms as the pupil population expanded. So now we hold all of our 16 different sections in our four local churches. Most sections we have now are

doing well, but we would welcome more people in the Monday Keep fit, Tennis, Bridge (plus other card and board games) afternoon, Whist, German Conversation and Sunday Ramblers.
