From the Chairman

INTRODUCTION

By the time you read this, summer will be well under way and hopefully we will be experiencing some warm and sunny weather. Now, in mid-June some parts of Eastern England have received 110mm (over 4 inches in old money) of rain in 24 hours — this after weeks of drought. Global warming?? Who knows?

Once again, I can report that members of the committee have been working hard, answering your many queries, contacting the council and delving into the complexities of planning regulations.

STATION DEVELOPMENT

Further information about the development is non-existent. We have a statement from Curtin & Co, the development co-ordinators, that says nothing. (See below). Phone calls and emails to the TfL development manager remain unanswered. Yet, TfL has renewed the pavement in Station Approach and offered tenants new leases.

How different from the last consultation when TfL leant over backwards to communicate with residents. As he states in his article on page 7, MP Nick Hurd is very much against the current proposed development, so we are guaranteed his total support.

You may have seen, and possibly signed, a petition sponsored by Northwood's Voice which is against "the TfL proposed total development of the Conservation Area of Green Lane and Station Approach". The NRA Committee does not feel it is right to object to the scheme until plans are submitted. Also, we feel that some development of the site is unavoidable but again, until we have seen the final plans we cannot comment or take definite action.

We have taken positive action by asking Greater London Authority member, Susan Hall, to submit Questions to the Mayor of London about the effects of closing the station car park. As yet we have not had a reply.

Annual General Meeting

We had a bumper turnout for the AGM, over 180 people including guests and committee members - nearly 100 more residents than last year. Many attended to discuss the Station development and a lively discussion ensued with 99% of attendees against TfL's proposals.

Our guest speaker was the Commanding Officer of Northwood Base, Group Captain Jason Sutton, who gave us an extremely interesting review of the history of, and the operations at, the base. I also appreciated that he stayed to the end of the meeting and mingled with residents.

Nick Hurd made a stirring speech about defeating TfL's current plans.

Our subscription was maintained at a minimum of £2 per household and £10 for business members and the usual plea was made for new Road Stewards. We appointed a new

President; Valerie Mellor agreed to take on the role, replacing Alan Prue. (See more, page 6)

MAJOR PLANNING APPLICATIONS A personal gripe!

Major planning applications are heard by a Planning Committee of councillors. Northwood College recently submitted an application for a large new block to be built in the Maxwell Road



Conservation Area. The meeting was streamed live on YouTube and I was extremely surprised that after much discussion, the councillors decided that they needed to visit the site before making a decision.

Surely a routine site visit should be made before councillors start the decision process. Would anyone buy a large expensive item before seeing it? I think not.

MOUNT VERNON HOSPITAL

Northwood residents often refer to Mount Vernon Hospital as a single unit. For clarification, the Mount Vernon Hospital site is owned by The Hillingdon Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust (THH) and is home to several tenants: Bishops Wood, Mount Vernon Cancer Centre, Michael Sobell, Paul Strickland, Lynda Jackson, etc. THH is responsible for the operations of the Treatment Centre, Minor Injuries Unit, the Outpatients clinic, Trinity Ward, X-Ray department, Daniel and Edmunds Wards. Bishops Wood is a private hospital, the Mount Vernon Cancer Centre is run by East and North Hertfordshire NHS Trust and the others are separate charities.

It is well known that THH has been underfunded for many years and that its property is somewhat dilapidated. THH is now in the process of producing a case for a new-build on the Brunel University campus. This process is expected to take up to two years. In the meantime, the current premises both at Hillingdon and Mount Vernon are in need of refurbishment and THH has applied to the NHS for additional funding to carry out essential work to make the premises safe for patients and staff.

CONCLUSION

Thanks to all who make the NRA a successful organisation – Road Stewards, committee members, councillors, MP and, last but not least, you our members.

Summer is time for rest and recuperation but no doubt we will be kept busy. Do please keep asking your questions and remember I'm very happy to talk to you.

Traffic and Highways



NORTHWOOD TRAFFIC STUDY In mid-2018 a transport study was carried out for LBH, including the following roads:

- A404 Rickmansworth Road
- B469 Green Lane between Rickmansworth Road and Maxwell Road
- Maxwell Road

Several months ago the report was submitted to Cllr. Burrows, Cabinet Member for Planning, Transportation and Recycling, for review. The main recommendations were listed in the last edition of the NRA Newsletter. Unfortunately, little progress, if any, seems to have been made since then.

RICKMANSWORTH ROAD

Excavation works to install ducting and build assorted chambers for a fibre optic cable installation are proceeding as I write, and appear to be going well, with very little disruption. If things continue to go to plan, the Northwood Ward part of this project should be completed by mid-July, moving on through Northwood Hills and then into Harrow around mid-August.

GREEN LANE

"Carriageway Repairs – Nightwork" were scheduled to take place between nos. 80 and 100 Green Lane early in May, but I understand that some technical issues have arisen and the work has been postponed until these are "sorted out".

OUT OF WARD

Road works for HS2

Following negotiations with HS2, the start of the next planned 8 weeks closure of Breakspear Road South (BRS) has been delayed until at least 19th July, so as to be mainly in the school holiday period. It may be necessary to close BRS again in 2020 or 2021.

33kV power cables have to be laid between Rayners Lane and West Ruislip to supply the tunnel boring machines. Test borings will start in the next few months, with the main work starting in autumn 2019, lasting around a year. The cables will be routed along local roads, avoiding main roads where possible, probably working in 50m stages. At some stage this will involve Ickenham Road between Ruislip High Street and West Ruislip, hopefully not when BRS is closed!

Planning Matters

It has been quite an active three months with some fifty planning applications submitted. Having reviewed them, I submitted objections or comments on sixteen of the applications.

Bulk is a common reason for applications to be refused, particularly where the proposed works would change the street scene too much. That can happen, for instance, when the completed property would be much wider than the vast majority of houses in the street. When at the front of the house, new dormer windows in a roof converted into habitable space can have the same impact on the street scene.

Most applications continue to be for side and rear extensions or the conversion of garages or lofts into habitable space.

Objections can be made when the side extensions proposed are too close to the boundary and would have too great an impact on the neighbouring property, particularly if new windows would suddenly enable your neighbour to see inside your habitable rooms and thus cause a loss of privacy. Rear extensions can also have an adverse impact on occasion and fail to comply with planning guidelines.

I know that the last thing anyone needs is confrontation with a neighbour by objecting to their planning application, but, so long as the objection is on planning grounds, then that must be the right thing to do, as, should consent be given it is then too late.

As a reminder, it is easy to make an objection to a planning application on the London Borough of Hillingdon website, when there is a valid reason on planning grounds. There is a search facility where you enter the property address to find the application details, and then a comment can be made which goes to the Case Officer and is attached to the application. The search page is found by going to https://hillingdon.gov.uk/ From the home page follow Planning and building then Search for planning applications.

There continue to be a significant number of applications relating to trees protected by Tree Preservation Orders, either as standalone applications or as part of a planning application. I do raise a comment where there is no statement regarding the replacement of these trees.

There has been a change relating to rear extensions. Temporary rules, which allowed bigger single-storey rear extensions without a full planning application, are being made permanent. Additions to terraced and semi-detached homes can be up to 6m, while detached houses will be able to add structures up to 8m long. The Planning Authority must be informed of the proposed work via a prior approval application and neighbours will still be consulted and can raise planning objections to the proposed extension.

TfL has delayed its application for Station Approach and the station car park until at least the Autumn, and have stated there will be further public consultations before any application is submitted. We do hope that TfL will take into account the views expressed at the consultations.

In addition to reviewing the planning applications made, I attend the quarterly Residents Planning Forum meetings, held

at the Civic Centre, at which all of the Residents'

Associations in the borough have an opportunity to question the Chief Planning Officer and senior staff on current planning matters of concern, and they outline current matters affecting the borough as a whole as well as the larger planning applications. This is an excellent facility provided by the planning department at LBH.

NORTHWOOD TOWN CENTRE, GREEN LANE CONSERVATION AREA


Members of the NRA committee joined London Borough of Hillingdon conservation officials on a walkabout of Northwood Town Centre and a draft Conservation Area Appraisal is now open to public consultation.

The draft explains all about the Northwood Conservation Area with its many pluses, and some minuses, and proposes 14 additional buildings should now be Locally Listed. These buildings are mainly already within the Northwood

Conservation Area, but also St Matthew's Church in Hallowell Road, St John's School in Potter Street Hill, and numbers 27 and 46 The Drive.

LBH is requesting comments to be made and we would encourage you to do so. The consultation period is 6 weeks from 12th June, so ending on 23rd July.

As a point of interest, the Coral building at 54-56 Green Lane is amongst those proposed to be Locally Listed, it is at the top of Station Approach and within the site TfL proposes to demolish. It would certainly be helpful if that property was Locally Listed as that strengthens its importance as it is already within the Northwood Conservation Area.



Unlike Listed Buildings, buildings on the Local List do not enjoy statutory protection and are subject to normal planning controls. However, their inclusion on the Local List does mean that the council will take into account the building's special local architectural and/or historic interest. Applications involving the demolition of a building of local importance will normally be refused, unless such works can be fully justified and a replacement building of suitable quality provided.

A Message from Nick Hurd MP

It was a pleasure to speak at the recent AGM of your Residents' Association. The hall was packed. The magnet may have been my power of oratory, but I doubt it. People came because they are deeply concerned about TfL's radical plans to change Northwood Town Centre. I told the meeting that I was opposed to them and I have made that clear also to TfL.

The plan is drawn up to get approval from the Mayor on appeal. That is why it has high levels of "affordable" housing and almost no parking for all the new Northwood residents. This is a plan designed to fit with the Mayor's London Plan and not what is right for Northwood. I am all for encouraging public transport, and the need to reduce emissions and pollution, but there is a reason why Hillingdon has high levels of car ownership. So like many others, I am concerned about what this development will mean in terms of pressure on local roads and parking spaces.

The problem is made even worse by the apparent policy of the Mayor to do away with parking at underground stations. The proposal to remove the Northwood station car park is fundamental to the TfL proposal and is based on the argument that it is not fully utilised and that car drivers will divert to other stations. Residents know that the former is not true and are right to be sceptical about the latter. Again, common sense tells you that the development is going to create problems with drivers trying to find parking in local streets.

This is the third proposal by TfL, and in my view significantly worse than the last one, which divided the community. Last time TfL went out of their way to engage with the community, but they are taking a different and more traditional approach this time. There will be



some minor adjustments, but they will come forward with basically the same proposal as a formal application. I have always been clear that I am not against redevelopment. Station Approach and the Station could do with an upgrade. It would be good to have new shops and places to meet up. The need for more affordable housing in Northwood is real. However, redevelopments of this scale need to go with the grain of the area. This plan does not, and we will have to work together to make sure that the voice of Northwood is heard in City Hall.

From the Treasurer

Our membership levels and subscriptions remain solid so at the AGM it was agreed not to change the subs hence they remain as a minimum of £2 per household and £10 for businesses. I must stress the word *minimum* since without the larger subscriptions paid by the majority, we would have no choice but to raise the minimum. In time I hope and expect most subs received will be in excess of £5 and then the change to a new minimum will be without issue. Another development is that the subs have been paid more promptly. Thanks to the Road Stewards and obviously members for achieving this. The financial year ends on the 31st December each year and ideally all subs for that year should have been received in that year. It avoids creating debtors for the late receipts and enables easier year-on-year comparisons to be made.

Questions sometimes arise as to what happens if members join during the year. Given the modest subs I would suggest they pay the full amount; if new members move into Northwood in December and paying the full annual sub seems

wrong, perhaps wait until January but discuss it with the Road Steward. We wish the process to be as simple and transparent as it can be.

Producing the newsletters remains the largest expense. It is also an expense well worth the money in my view. It is the only physical product that is distributed to all members and that action can enable communication or facilitate subs collections. If the newsletter was published only online these benefits would be lost and any members with no easy internet access would lose this resource.

The current methods do enable us to have an accurate membership list and information flows. It is important residents' views are known and the majority represented. The higher our membership, the greater our impact so please ensure you know your Road Steward and keep those subs flowing in.

Environment

HEDGES: SHRUBS: TREES It is that time of year again!



Can residents and garden contractors please trim back the overgrowth of hedges, shrubs and tree foliage that narrows Northwood's paths? Take a look at the picture and if this is more or less what the outside of your property looks like, then it is time for you to act and to cut back the overgrowth.

By the same token it is up to our council to trim back the trunk growth on the trees that line many pavements. If one of these is outside your property you can ask the council to do that trimming.

Leylandii Owners — a special plea to you. Lop the top off and if it is very tall reduce it by a third. Leylandii grow at a very fast rate each year and size reduction has to keep pace. If a neighbour refuses to reduce the height of their Leylandii, you can always gen up on the powers available to you to gain redress under the terms of the High Hedges Act. Out of control Leylandii cast massive shadows and cause loss of sunlight all too easily. Thank you.

There is an informative article on the LBH website under the heading "Neighbour's high hedges" and a similar one for Three Rivers. As the LBH site is currently being redesigned and you could find yourself on either the new or the archived version, the safest instruction we can give is to suggest using the search box in order to find the article. Remember, always

try to exhaust other avenues to resolve a high tree or hedge problem with a neighbour, before recourse to the council and use of the High Hedges Act.

These matters come within the area of Anti-Social Behaviour. Again, the Hillingdon Council website has lots of useful information and contacts; find the page by searching for "Anti-social behaviour". It can be as simple as clicking the 'report it' button. Noise Nuisance comes under Pollution. It is worth noting that there is an out-of-hours phone number that you can use if you need immediate action e.g. a noisy party going on into the small hours.

Out of hours contact details for LBH Anti-social Behaviour and Environment Team (ASBET) Investigates and takes enforcement actions against people who commit offences against persons or property.

Councillors' Column

In our last newsletter, Scott revealed the contents of our local **elected councillors' postbags; this time he tells us more about their** role:

After we've dealt with the post, the rest involves face-to-face meetings and more public ones including:

SCHOOL VISITS. Once a year I speak to a local school PHSE class about local government and with colleagues we engage closely with the junior and secondary sector in the ward concerning challenges they have, both council-related and other.

SYNAGOGUE AND CHURCH events and engagement is also a big part of local life in the ward; our faith communities are strong and well attended. From the regular events the churches hold to the annual Civic Service at the Liberal synagogue they allow us to engage with and meet residents in a less formal environment.

NRA EXEC. Working with the NRA committee directly generates a lot of member enquiries about services. I meet with them perhaps twice a year to check on issues and on the progress with longer-standing concerns we've reported previously. It's a great way to hear from the wonderful volunteers who alongside the Street Champions (and many

are both!) act as the additional eyes and ears on the streets for us.

The rest of our role involves the more formal side of council life from committee meetings to full council and party meetings and business-like campaigning and electioneering.

Health Matters

HOSPICE CARE IN HILLINGDON. Following the changes made by East and North Herts Trust to the delivery of palliative care services at the Mount Vernon Hospital site in June 2018 there has been a gap in inpatient hospice provision in the borough and in particular inpatient palliative care for non-cancer patients. This is resulting in poor patient and carer experience.

There was a preference to utilise the original hospice accommodation. However, the HCCG has made a decision for the direct award of a 12 month contract to Harlington Hospice as lead provider within Hillingdon Health and Care Partners to pilot a model including:

- Inpatient hospice care
- A 24 hour consultant-led phone line
- Day Centre services

and delegated the decision to go live with the service to a working group constituted as set out in the business case. The Hillingdon Hospital, Harlington Hospice, Hillingdon CCG and Michael Sobell Hospice will be working together to ensure the accommodation is fit for purpose for the next two years.

THE HILLINGDON COUNCIL'S TELECARELINE SERVICE This service enables more than 5,000 Hillingdon residents to live independently in their own homes. Its 24-hour monitoring and alert system helps people to feel safe and supported on a day-to-day basis and in an emergency. It also provides them, their carers, friends and family with daily peace of mind. The system works by linking alarms, sensors and equipment in the home to an adviser in the TeleCareLine monitoring centre, which is staffed 24 hours a day, every day of the year. Monthly cost for the four different services ranges from £4.91 to £52, depending on the level of support needed. All four services are free to Hillingdon residents who are aged 75 and over.



Local Policing from the NRA Police Liaison Officer

As well as my role on the NRA I chair the Northwood police ward panel and I chair the Hillingdon Safer Neighbourhood Board. These roles allow me to have a broader understanding of both local policing and borough-wide matters and upwards to the whole Met-wide portfolio. When writing to you in this newsletter my focus is always on local matters but I hope it may be of interest to you to see the whole borough-wide perspective.

THERE HAVE BEEN HUGE STRUCTURAL CHANGES in the Met Police over the last year; Hillingdon is now joined with Hounslow and Ealing to form the West Area Borough Command Unit (BCU). The BCU itself is controlled by fewer high-rank officers who have to spread themselves rather thinly.

In Hillingdon some local wards have had to deal with shortages of Dedicated Ward Officers (DWOs) who are the fine ladies and gents we see around almost daily. They deal with neighbourhood policing. The good news is that from 1st July all vacant posts will be filled.

The West Area BCU has seen an influx of over 150 new police constables. This is good news for policing in our area; it means there are now more people on response teams dealing with the urgent and dangerous incidents. However, this large influx means that response teams now have large numbers of inexperienced officers. This is a critical officer safety issue that must be addressed. For the safety of officers who are attending the most dangerous calls and for those people

calling for police help, we must have a mix of experience and new recruits on response teams. Because of this a decision has been made that a small number of DWOs will move from Neighbourhood Policing to response teams and they will be replaced by relatively new constables. This is not about disrespecting Neighbourhood officers, or the community, it is about keeping people safe and that will not be compromised. Northwood will be one of those affected areas. As the changes crystalise we will keep you advised. There will not be fewer officers, just possibly less well-known ones. I know you will make them welcome.

OWL – we are all asking residents to join the On Line Watch Link system which gives the local ward police and others the opportunity to tell you about what is happening, what has happened and give personal and property security advice. But we need more of you to sign up. It is proving to be a huge success in other parts of the borough where take-up is much higher. Car thieves and burglars are being caught due to the intelligence gained via the public through the OWL system. Please sign up and be part of it. www.owl.co.uk




Training for Red Cross Nurses at MVH c.1968. The 'patient' is Police Sgt McFarlane



s I come to the end of my 8-year Headship of **St Helen's** I have been reflecting on the school's place in the Northwood community.

St Helen's is proud to be celebrating its 120th birthday this year. The school moved to the site of School House on Eastbury Road in 1902 and, at that stage, offered day and boarding education to some 40 girls. Since then, it has changed enormously and evolved into one of the three largest girls' day independent schools in the country, with more than 1100 pupils (aged from 3 to 18) which draws families from across a wide area, as well as from Northwood. Young women today enter the employment market with the full expectation that they will have successful professional lives, on an equal footing with young men.

We are so fortunate to have our feet very firmly planted in the Northwood community and we endeavour to contribute to the well-being of that community in as many ways as we can. We support local charities including care homes; we run a fortnightly Phab Club; our students volunteer in local charity shops, and we are developing strong links with local primary schools and the NATO Base. We seek ways of opening our facilities to all our neighbours whether through the Sports Centre, the holiday camps for children, or theatre groups and commit all the income raised through such enterprises to support bursaries enabling girls whose families would not be

able to afford our fees, to come to us to benefit from our education.

We enjoy a privileged position at the heart of Northwood and its local economy and with that comes responsibilities. Key to these is the preservation and promotion of our environment whether that be by constructing green buildings (our new buildings incorporate advanced energy



saving technology using 130 solar panels); encouraging walking and public transport to school by 'Walk to School Wednesday'; by developing our STARS travel plan (which we hope will soon be awarded a Gold Star) and by ensuring that we develop new initiatives which contribute to our Eco School Green Flag which we have proudly held since 2010.

I am grateful for this opportunity to thank you and the community of Northwood for your continuing support of the school.
