Traffic and Highways

Green Lane/Eastbury Road/Station Approach Traffic Lights:

Following so much concern about the traffic lights, LBH made a bid to TfL for the funding of an independent review by external consultants.

It is anticipated that the review will begin in April or May.

Ducks Hill Road/Rickmansworth Road Traffic Lights:

There has been a spate of accidents at this junction over the past few months. NRA has asked for a "red light" camera to be installed there, but the future of the Safety Camera Partnership, which would fund such a camera, is under review due to budget cuts.

The barriers are in a poor state and are due to be repaired shortly.

Membership

The NRA's Road Stewards are its life-blood, since it is they who carry out the absolutely vital role of delivering the newsletters to our members. We are always in need of new Road Stewards. This arises for two main reasons: firstly some of our loyal band of Road Stewards are calling it a day after many years of service, eg David Benatar after more than 40 years carrying out such duties - a magnificent achievement; and secondly certain roads in the NRA catchment area either have never been covered or at least not in recent years, compounded by the number of new blocks of flats being built in the area. The NRA newsletter is delivered three times a year to members.

The other aspect of a Road Steward's job is to collect the annual subscriptions, issue a receipt, and get the monies to the Treasurer before the end of the calendar year.

The method of collection of subscriptions is a matter of choice for individual Road Stewards. The two main methods used are as follows:

(a) collect the subscription when delivering the newsletter. The benefit of this method is direct contact with members, but the downside is that it may not be convenient for the member to speak to the Road Steward at that time or the member may not be in.
(b) make use of the NRA subscription envelope system, whereby the envelope is delivered with the newsletter with a request that the member delivers the envelope and subscription back to the Road Steward in due

course. This method takes less of a Road Steward's time, but gives less direct contact with members.

Ideally, a Road Steward covers a road or block of flats in which he or she resides, but the number of residences covered is very much at the discretion of the Road Steward. Some do a number of roads, others a small cul-de-sac.

Roads which are currently in need of a Road Steward are as follows (apologies for any possible errors/omissions):

Athena Place, Beech Court, Birch Court, Churchill Court, Daintry Lodge, Dormans Close, Drakes Drive, Ducks Hill Road (part), Farm End, Frithwood Avenue (part), Grangedale Close, Green Lane (part), Hurst Place, Ivy Walk, Jackets Lane, James Court, Kingfisher Close, Lingfield Close, Lynwood Drive, Manor House Drive, Rising Hill Close, Sevenoaks Court, Station Approach, Tanworth Close, Teal Drive, Trinity Close, Wilford Close, and a number of blocks of flats.

Advertising Banners on Railings

NRA has been informed that there has been a full investigation of the issues surrounding this problem by LBH. The police have been consulted. Their view was that banners on railings constituted a danger for traffic and should be stopped. As a result of this it seems likely that LBH will ban all banners from railings, including those advertising charity or community events which have been licensed in the past. However, NRA has suggested in the past that banners might be displayed on the railings by Green Lane car park, and this possibility is still under discussion.

Metropolitan Line

Regular commuters will be only too aware of the appalling deterioration in the Met Line "service". Not only have they had to contend with the usual, almost daily, signal failures, but also problems with the old rolling stock, leading to unprecedented numbers of cancellations.

The new timetable, introduced in early December, has been nothing short of disastrous. The driver changeover point and canteen have been moved from Wembley Park to Harrow on the Hill, and journeys are now regularly disrupted while passengers wait for a new driver.

Commuters are frankly in despair at the frequent cancellations and the fact that journeys are now taking so much longer that they are often late for work and missing meetings. Obviously the cold weather hasn't helped, but other surface lines, such as the Central and Piccadilly, seem to cope better than the Met.

Another frequent complaint is lack of any information, particularly from station staff, plus the highly irritating "good service" announcements when the opposite is the case.

There are now more new "S" stock trains coming into service, and they can at last go as far as Baker Street. As mentioned in the last newsletter, they are running on the old signals for the next few years, which is far from ideal. The main drawback, however, is the reduction in seating by about 30%.

Mike Brown, Managing Director of London Underground, is aware of the discontent amongst Met Line commuters, and is attending the January meeting that FOMLUC is having with Met management We will take this opportunity to leave him in no doubt that the Met is not fit for purpose, and that we need improvements NOW, and not in 6-8 years time. Please continue to let us know of your horror stories so that we can pass them on to London Underground management.

website www.dh.gov.uk, come thick and fast. In our October 2010 Newsletter, reference was made to the July 2010 White Paper **'Equity and Excellence:** Liberating the NHS' which set out their long-term vision for the future of the NHS.

Since then, supporting documents have been published, including:

Liberating the NHS: Greater choice and control'
 'An Information Revolution – a consultation on proposals'

In November 2010 a second White Paper 'Healthy Lives, Healthy People: Our strategy for public **health in England'** was published.

Change is on the way, but why is it necessary?

Our health and social care systems are good in many ways, but in certain respects we lag behind other countries, such as in cancer survival rates. We have considerable problems with obesity, smoking, drug and alcohol abuse, mental health and sexually transmitted infections. Poor outcomes are often related to poverty and poor education and there are inequalities even in relatively small areas, such as within

Hillingdon's individual wards. As the population gets older, costs and expectations go up, so we need to save money – which we can do by improving quality. Joining health care and social care should also prove economical whilst offering seamless care to service users. People should be more involved in their own health and social care, and they should be encouraged to look after themselves with healthy eating and appropriate exercise. The NHS needs to modernise, cut out waste and offer the quality and outcomes we expect.

The route to this ideal is through choice. Patients will be able to choose their GP, consultant, treatment and hospital or other local health service. Choice and shared decision-making have to be safe, sustainable and **affordable. 'No decision about me without me' is the** phrase of the moment. GPs will work together in consortia and will, together, buy services for patients. They will be more accountable to their patients.

The Government tells us that funding for the NHS will increase each year of this Government by 'cutting out waste, reducing bureaucracy and simplifying NHS structures'.

An NHS Commissioning Board, independent and accountable, will, among other duties, address inequalities in access to health care.

Patients will need access to informed opinion if they are to be effectively involved in decision-making. We are promised better access to our health and social care records. A new national body, HealthWatch England, will represent patients' views within the Care Quality Commission.

Councils will have greater involvement in local health services, being responsible for local health care priorities, integrating health and care services and ensuring that the needs of the local community are met. They will lead the development of local public health services. In 2012 a new body, Public Health England, will function as part of the Department of Health.

I have asked NHS Hillingdon and some of our local hospitals how these proposals are likely to impact on our local services. They replied:

NHS Hillingdon

Patient satisfaction with hospitals across North West London is variable and patients have been dissatisfied with maternity services and access to GPs. Demand for NHS services is going to rise and it is envisaged that by 2014/15 healthcare in North West London will have a shortfall of £1bn.

We can look forward to a period of open discussion with key stakeholders as to how this deficit may be managed satisfactorily. PCTs are now 'clustered' and Hillingdon is clustered with Ealing and Hounslow under one Chief Executive, Robert Creighton. The senior management team has been streamlined to avoid duplication and improve efficiency. New staff structures are being proposed at this time; although we are assured that front-line care will not be compromised.

From 1 February 2011, the relatively small Hillingdon Community Health (HCH) – provider of our community services such as district nursing, health visitors and children's services – is to integrate with the much larger Central and North West London NHS Foundation Trust (CNWL). We are assured that there will be no redundancies and no change in type or location of services provided. CNWL is hoping that people in Hillingdon will become members of CNWL Trust, to have a direct say in its future plans. There is a Council of Members, in which Governors, elected by members, represent the interests of the local community and decide the strategic direction and development of the Trust. Police Panel

Sgt Stacey has outlined the current difficulties the SNT is facing. Significant local economies will have to be made during the coming months and certainly until after the Olympic Games in 2012. Meanwhile we in Northwood enjoy a peaceful life without parallel in the borough, but we still need your co-operation. Poor driving standards, particularly speeding and use of mobile phones when driving are a major concern. These problems are always kept at the top of the agenda but with staff shortages it means that there are insufficient resources to tackle the problem as aggressively as we would wish.

I have emphasised on many occasions the need for vigilance in securing homes and safeguarding property. Our police believe that even one burglary is one too many, but there is always something each resident can do to help himself. The SNT is trained and keen to help so never hold back from asking for crime prevention advice.

Always beware of bogus callers – they are about so always ask for proof of identity if someone unexpected knocks at your door and remember to use the chain on your door.

Health Matters ctd

The Hillingdon Hospital NHS Trust
The application for The Hillingdon & Mount Vernon
Hospital to become an NHS Foundation Trust is in its
final stages. Although there will be increased
competition for services, it is felt that the hospital is well
placed to thrive in a more competitive environment.
The Treatment Centre at Mount Vernon is impressive
and links with local GPs are being strengthened.
Performance has been good. Savings over the next 4
years will have to be increased from 3% p.a. to at least
4%. It is hoped to achieve this through greater efficiency.

Royal Brompton & Harefield NHS Foundation Trust

Patients are not purely local, but come from a wide area and are often referred by doctors from other hospitals. Flagship services, such as the heart attack centre, will

continue to be supported and a close working relationship with ambulance services will continue so that the right patients are brought in quickly for primary angioplasty. Early in 2011, the Trust hopes to open a new catheter laboratory for less urgent cases. The Trust is in a strong position, having recently invested in a new theatres complex.

Watford General Hospital

Part of the West Hertfordshire NHS Hospitals Trust which is applying for Foundation Trust status, Watford Hospital is involved in the 'Big Ask' programme which aims to cut costs without compromising patient safety. The Trust has a target of £19.3m to save in 2010/11 and 'Big Ask' has highlighted £13.3m so far. The high costs of temporary staff and expensive drugs have to be addressed.

Planning

In spite of the credit crunch 2010 has been a busy year for planning. I summarise some higher profile cases here and monthly reports are on our web site.

The development of the site of the Reindeer public house in Maxwell Road is still uncertain. The developer appealed against the council's decision to refuse the plan. Tony and I attended the appeal hearing on 30th November and we await the result. In the meantime, following continued pressure from the NRA, the developers have modified their alternative plans to a more acceptable building.

Many of you will know the residential care home at 36-38 Chester Road is near completion. Plans for number 34 were also allowed but no construction work has started. The developer applied to add 30-32 to the complex and residents, supported by the NRA petitioned the council. The application was refused and we await the results of an appeal. The developers have strayed from the authorised plans at 36-38 and the enforcement officer has declined to take action as he awaits an application for retrospective planning permission. I am continuing to put pressure on the LBH head of planning to enforce the authorised plans and have complained about the conduct of the enforcement officer in respect of another matter.

Local residents, supported by the NRA, successfully persuaded the planning committee to refuse additional development of the nursing home at 12 Eastbury Road. The councillors commended Breda Nuttall's presentation to the committee as, "A victory by residents over developers."

The NRA objected to an application to demolish 41 Frithwood Avenue and build a block of flats and the council refused the application. The developer has appealed and I have requested that our MP, Nick Hurd, writes to the Planning Inspector asking that he respects the Government's position on garden grabbing.

Esporta, at 18 Ducks Hill Road, has applied to build a Golf Driving Range on Green Belt Land. Residents and the NRA have objected and petitioned the council. We await a hearing at the Planning North Committee.

We continue to object to oversized extensions and the replacement of suitable buildings by over-dominant mansions.

Renewal is easy, but no reminders are sent, so check your card today! Visit www.nhs.uk/healthcareabroad or telephone 0845 606 2030. You can apply to renew when there are less than six months left on your card.

The European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) allows you to access state-provided healthcare in all European Economic Area (EEA) countries and Switzerland at a reduced cost or sometimes free of charge.

Unfortunately we do not have a section for tobogganing or skating, which would have been handy in snowy December! Not wanting any broken limbs before Christmas, some events were cancelled.



We were very grateful to all the local papers which printed the picture postcard of our Club's 'Founding Fathers' and to residents who gave us useful information. Identities were established for three of the eight gentlemen in the photo: Harry Brookman was the first Club Captain and lived in Addison Way, where he was well-known for his window-cleaning business, with his ladders transported on a yellow painted side-car attached to his bicycle. James Page was Club President from 1935 to 1957, and lived at 'Grimscar' in The Drive; he was a builder and property developer. Bill Plaister, the gentleman in the large trilby hat on the right of the photo, was a Club member but was not on the Committee; we learned that he lived in Hilliard Road and worked at Rawlinsons Printers in Emmanuel Road, where Marlborough Court now stands.

The other five gentlemen were Club and Committee members but remain unidentified, and we wish to ask Northwood residents to help us by looking through this list of names and addresses from 1939. Do you recognise a Grandfather or neighbour here, and is there a photograph of them in a family album which we can
