I am extremely concerned that the NRA Executive is failing to attract members to give of their time to run the organisation. There are a number of posts which we urgently require to be filled and unless we can quickly achieve this then we will be left with no other option than to either, at best, severely curtail our operations or, at worst, to disband the organisation. This latter possibility is a very real one which will leave residents with only the local Councillors to look to for assistance with their problems. We also bring about many improvements to Northwood. This service will be lost.

The list of Executive Committee vacancies appears below.

Currently we have an extremely active Chairman who works tirelessly on behalf of the organisation, supported ably by our Vice Chairman, Treasurer, Chief Road Steward and Membership Secretary. Two committee briefs (Planning and Traffic & Highways) are currently held by me, the others are vacant. However, according to our constitution, I should not be a voting member of the Executive Committee and am doing so at present only because I have been temporarily co-opted to fill the casual vacancies. All of the vacancies must be filled at the AGM.

The existence of an active Residents' Association is vital to the well-being of Northwood's residents, young and old alike. I urge you to consider sparing a few hours a month and to take an active part in the community life of Northwood by standing as an Executive Committee Member. Traffic and Highways

Northgate revisited. Complaints by Northgate residents concerning illegal turns into the road by traffic from Ducks Hill Road have been passed to Councillor Scott Seaman-Digby who will hopefully now determine together with Council Officers how this situation will be resolved. It would now appear that the Council and not the Police have responsibility for control of the situation but not the facilities to take enforcement action!

Pot Holes. We have received complaints about the road surface in Nicholas Way which in one part of the road is indeed in a parlous state. This situation has also been made known to our local Councillors in the hope that they can mobilise our Council Officers into some action.

Dangerous U-turns. No response has been received from either our local Councillors or Council Officers with reference to our request to look at what could be done to stop drivers exiting left from The Avenue onto the Rickmansworth Road and then making a U-turn around the traffic island to head towards Northwood Hills. I have personally witnessed this occur on at least two occasions with in one instance the vehicle mounting the pavement.

And more dangerous turning. The NRA is now holding a watching brief over the Council's dealing with a petition by Woodridge Way residents concerned about their difficulty in exiting their road due to an inability to see traffic approaching from the right. The Council has taken well in excess of a year to consider the petition but has now promised to come up with a proposal shortly. We await action!







Another Northgate? A road sign has appeared in Frithwood Avenue requiring vehicles wishing to access Watford Road to turn only right between the hours of 7.00am and 9.00am. This would appear to be a somewhat peculiar request requiring crossing the traffic travelling up the Watford Road. We have asked Councillor Seaman-Digby to investigate why this is necessary. Are we creating another Northgate situation?

From the Treasurer

Global Economy. 2012 was an interesting year with a Royal Jubilee and the Olympics, starting with a drought but finishing in the record books for being the wettest year in parts. 2013 may not have such large events to provide distractions but there is the small issue of a World Cup to qualify for and the economy is still not showing the growth hoped for. The indecision in the Euro zone is no doubt playing a part and the skewed expenditure patterns of the last decade will take time to filter through. Spending on borrowed money basically is spending tomorrow's income today; some rebalancing is required.

NRA Economy. The NRA income and expenditure in 2012 was fairly neutral so we still have healthy reserves. The organisation does need some reserves so we can fight for Northwood when necessary. However, should you have an idea for a project for which some capital spend would benefit Northwood, please let us know what you have in mind for consideration.

LBH Economy. The Council spends money in sometimes mysterious ways. The No Left Turn from Frithwood Avenue into Watford Road between 07:00 and 09:00, Mon to Fri baffles me no end. I can see no benefit from this restriction but a lot of quite dangerous drawbacks. E.g. if traffic cannot turn left, it will either turn right or be forced to complete a U turn. Turning right is much more difficult and dangerous than simply turning left to join the traffic. Having done so, a left turn into Elgood

is one possible option, followed by a U turn and another right turn into Watford Road so the desired direction is obtained. Or carry on and get to the mini-



roundabout with the High St, join Green Lane and then turn into Watford road at the next mini-roundabout. Or having turned right, some traffic may continue to Green Lane and turn around at the mini-roundabout, which is also not desirable, or possible for some vehicles. For traffic that completed a U turn, it will mean a diversion back to Eastbury Road and a trip down Carew Rd to make a left into Watford Rd, or along Eastbury Avenue, where a left turn into Watford Rd is more difficult since it is on a bend and the speed limit is 40mph at that junction.

The road sign cost money to produce and erect, and will cost in terms of wasted fuel and pollution. It is likely to cause accidents with more right turns and more traffic along roads busy with school children at that time. I urge everyone affected to contact the council to suggest the removal of these restrictions.

NRA funds can benefit all. So sensible ideas that would benefit Northwood, please; the NRA does not wish to create anything that does not enhance the area for the benefit of all.

Chairman's Report - Tony Ellis



Introduction

The Editor has given the lead article to the President's Comment which I totally endorse. The Executive Committee and I work very hard on your behalf. The number of questions answered, and the number of subjects dealt with has increased considerably in the last year and we have had to

deal with these with dwindling resources. Members always seem grateful for this work and yet very few seem to want to give anything in return.

Unfortunately lack of volunteers isn't specific to Northwood. Many residents' associations throughout the country are suffering in a similar manner. Whatever happened to the "Olympic Effect"?

We are going to discuss the future of the NRA at the AGM in March (see page 11). Please come and have your say.

Station Approach

Last year it was revealed that Transport for London was considering developing their property in Northwood. Tentative plans have been drawn up to demolish the whole block from the frontage with Green Lane (from Coral Bookmakers to the alley next to Lee Garden, Chinese Takeaway) down to the car park replacing it with housing, a supermarket (possibly Sainsbury's), a multi-storey car park and a bus station. No provision has been made for re-siting the existing shops, businesses and the car body repair shop. It is also likely that Waitrose would close if a new supermarket opened.

These thriving businesses are an integral part of Northwood and bring people into the town. Their loss, and the opening of a supermarket, would deal a fatal blow to Northwood and cause the closure of many of the remaining businesses. Those of you who were living here when Waitrose opened in 1987 will remember that many shops subsequently closed as they couldn't compete.

On 17th January, with the help of Farah Condor of Senses, I convened a meeting with Dr Onkar Sahota, GLA member for Hillingdon and Ealing, and the affected businesses. Ten business owners turned up. Dr Sahota undertook to raise a question with the Mayor at the next Council meeting and to help us fight TfL's plans. I have also sought help from Nick Hurd MP and our local councillors.

It is inevitable that TfL will wish to realise full value from the site. However, any development must exclude a supermarket and provide alternative premises for the current tenants. In fact, I believe that a suitable development could enhance Northwood and every effort will be made to ensure that residents are fully consulted.

Police

In January the Mayor of London announced a draft policing model for the Metropolitan Police which will concentrate spending on putting more officers on the beat, cutting back on senior and back-room staff and selling surplus premises. Consultation is taking place in February and closes on 6th March. In Hillingdon, the proposals include a doubling in size of the Safer Neighbourhoods Teams and an increase in other officers from 480 to 525. The closure and sale of Northwood Police Station is also proposed. As the Murray Road building is Grade 2 listed and in a conservation area, any redevelopment will be severely restricted.

When your Committee has the full facts, we will publish the details of how Northwood is affected on the NRA website and then consult with members as to the best way forward. A Police Inspector will explain the reorganisation at the AGM. In the meantime, please take the trouble to read the consultation document to be found at

Thanks also to Anna Davis who has been responsible for Environment for the last $3\frac{1}{2}$ years. As usual, a big thank you to our Area Road Stewards and Road Stewards for their valuable contributions. Finally I would also thank Tina Williams for tending our flowerbeds at the Station. They provide a touch of colour all year round.

I look forward to seeing many of you at the Annual General Meeting.

Environment

As this will be my last newsletter article, I thought I would give a brief overview of the environmental issues the NRA has tried to deal with.

The quality of the environment has an important impact on the vitality of our town centre. Residents are attracted to Green Lane and the High Street to shop, eat out, use services such as the Post Office, dentist or doctor. The biggest improvement I have seen to the environment of Northwood during the last few years has been the refurbishment of Green Lane, which was done to a high standard. More recently, the removal of the illuminated telephone kiosk outside Barnardo's, which many residents found inappropriate, was the result of an accident – unfortunate for the driver but with a silver lining for the environment of the town centre.

There have been a number of problems which come up regularly, such as the untidy proliferation of estate agents' boards outside properties which have long been sold or

let, the 'fly-posting' of unauthorised banners on street railings, the poor state of some pavements in residential roads, and the constant nuisance of overhanging branches from private gardens and street trees alike. Leaves provoke a love/hate reaction in many people – love them when attached to the trees, hate them when they hit the ground!

One serious blight on the environment of Northwood is the continuing saga of the Reindeer site. Although planning permission has been granted for a development, the project has stalled. We are left with an ugly gap in the streetscape and a problem area in front of the site which attracts rubbish. If there is one problem I would like to see resolved, it is this one.

The NRA will continue to monitor the state of Northwood's environment and take steps to improve matters where possible.

Road Stewards

Northwood Residents' Association is totally run by volunteers, with the aim of informing and assisting local residents to ensure Northwood continues to be a pleasant and congenial place to live. Your committee takes up all sorts of issues of concern with various departments in Hillingdon Council, and our local MP on your behalf, as well as inviting all members to the AGM to hear more of your views face-to-face. It also co-ordinates local amenities, such as the Christmas lights, the station platform flowerbeds and this last year the hugely successful Jubilee Celebration.

Our main means of communicating with you are our regularly updated website (**www.northwoodresidents.co.uk**) and of course this newsletter, which is published three times a year – usually in February, June and October.

Distribution of the Newsletter is down to me as Chief Road Steward – though with about 6,000 residences in our area, I don't do it all myself! I am assisted by I3 Area Road Stewards, who are in turn helped by, presently, around 90 Road Stewards. Each Road Steward is responsible for delivering Newsletters to members in from three to ten or more roads or blocks of flats around where they live, and once a year collecting the members' subscriptions. The Road Stewards are the point of personal contact between members and the NRA committee, and hence are vital.

Of course Area and Road Stewards move out of the area from time to time, and we all grow older and feel the need to retire eventually, so a steady stream of replacements is vital. We urgently need more volunteers to be Road Stewards. Could you spare just a little of your time to help us? You will be well supported by your Area Road Stewards, and we have regular get-togethers to exchange views and receive up-date training in record-keeping and member-recruitment. A map showing areas where Road Stewards are needed will be displayed at the AGM.

Our next get-together will be on 23rd April, which would be a great time to meet all the other Road Stewards if you join us, so please contact me. I look forward to hearing from you.

Awards and Activities in the Woods

Poor's Field, the area of Ruislip Common between the Lido and Northwood Golf course with access by the end of Links Way and Hills Lane, has been awarded the Britain in Bloom gold award. The management of the Common has also resulted in the award of 'London Common of the year' - and it's right on our doorstep!

Everyday work continues in the woods; the paths are in a terrible state following the wettest year on record. The Rangers are hoping to extend the boardwalks in many of the worst areas to help make them passable. Recycled plastic

boards, indistinguishable from the wooden ones, are being considered. They also last five times as long.

140 disease-resistant elm trees have been planted across the borough as part of a National scheme.

We hope to organise guided walks in the woods in the summer - details in the next newsletter.

Finally a date for your diaries: May 12th will be the day of the annual Woods Festival at the Lido, featuring Shire Horses, Falconry, Ferret-racing and many more woodland activities and crafts.

Have we had triumphs? Change always has many strings, but we are proud that remnants of plastic surgery still exist in Mount Vernon – thanks to our hard fought battle years ago. We are proud that our Cancer Centre still exists – what a fight we had to stop it moving to Hatfield! We are proud that NHS Boards now hold meetings in public – our campaign was long and hard.

When do we meet? First Thursday every month except August, at 7.45pm, in the Post Graduate Centre, Mount Vernon Hospital.

Who are our members? Residents' Associations, community groups – churches, sports clubs, branches of political parties, patient groups – plus individual members.

What else do members get? Ten monthly mailings, with minutes, agendas and news-sheets covering NHS national, regional and local news, particularly in Harrow, Hillingdon, and South West Herts.

What does it cost? Current subscriptions are £21 for an organisation (for two delegates), £9 for individual members, £13 for two from one household.

What are the current issues?

Locally: furore over the proposal to site a pharmacy in Northwood Health Centre.

At hospital level: what will happen to the last patients in Mount Vernon's Daniel Ward? When will our Cancer Centre get replacement wards? When will Hillingdon's car parking be resolved? Will Northwick Park merge with Ealing? Will Ealing's A&E be closed? Will Watford General be rebuilt? Will Royal Brompton save its children's heart surgery – would Harefield survive if it lost?

At regional level: who will take a strategic view of London's health services when NHS London disappears next April? Locally, the most pressing problem is Hillingdon Primary Care Trust's 2012-13 deficit. When the new Hillingdon Clinical Commissioning Group takes over in April will it inherit more than £15 million debt?

The Brown Badge Parking Scheme

Anyone who lives in the borough and is aged 65 or over is eligible to apply for a Brown Badge.

The brown badge gives motorists the use of dedicated parking spaces in council owned car parks and in some privately operated car parks in Hillingdon including Breakspear Crematorium and Ruislip Lido.



Designated spaces are marked close to exit points and where possible, nearest to the pay and display machines. You must display a Brown Badge and pay at the meter as normal. Badges must be displayed where it is clearly visible in the windscreen when parking in designated spaces.

How do I apply for a Brown Badge?


