Extracts from the minutes of Meeting 9 May 2023, 8pm in the Family Room, Methodist Church, Oaklands Gate

Present: Tony Ellis, Sue Mansfield, Valerie Mellor, Hoda Lacey, Ros Plume, Peter Lansdown, Paul Barker, Trevor Sherling, Amir Lakha, Andrew Egan, Vijay Kotecha, Jan Harding

Question and answer session with the Council Leader, Ian Edwards.

Cllr Edwards first apologised for not coming to the AGM and said he would plan to come next year. **Bus transport to Hillingdon Hospital:** talking to the London Mayor about overall investment in transport.

Frontage to the Green Lane Car Park: he will speak to his property people to find out what is going on with our proposal.

Cost of non-resident car parking and our car parking c.f. Harrow and Three Rivers: statistics will show our borough has one of the lowest council taxes, significantly less that those of surrounding boroughs.

Green Lane car park, use for driving school. Detriment would have to be shown to stop this. **Misuse of Green Lane car park for drug dealing etc**: the Borough Commander is reviewing local policing and movement is beginning to been seen in getting back to local policing.

Pavements: this year has biennial pavement inspections. Each one is assessed for their state and usage and history of accidents etc. The worst ones will be repaired maybe by replacing flags with tarmac. He would like to make this public information. Meanwhile please send in actual photos of building workers damaging pavements.

Potholes and manhole covers: new machines are being bought to work on these.

Planning enforcement: more is now being done. But a frequent tactic is resubmitting a planning application for what has actually been built, so that protesters have to show evidence of harm to support refusal of consent.

Parking limit of two hours in the High Street is not enforced. Put meters in?

Road Survey: PL to send Cllr Edwards details of the survey history including the report and NRA comments on it.

Lido car park: anomaly of Blue Badge holders from anywhere in the country being able to park for free. Will be investigated.

ULEZ: 25 May verbal hearing to reinstate two of the three grounds rejected initially. 4 July full hearing 1 day or more. Meanwhile the London Mayor may install cameras and notices on their property, such as traffic lights and road signs. A statement in Parliament said this can be done now.

IE agreed that the online **Report IT** system needs to be based on a more user-friendly model.

Cllr Edwards was thanked for his attendance and coverage of all items raised.

Apologies and Committee: Miles Gillman, Philip Green, Rajen Shah
TE proposed accepting the resignation of Rashmi Chauhan, regretting his necessity
for standing down and sending our good wishes and hoping that he might be able to
work with the committee again in future.

TE asked Jan Harding to introduce herself. She said she lives in Northwood, worked for some years as an accountant, then, living in Bangkok, studied gemmology and is now looking for additional activity here. TE has taken up satisfactory references and proposed that the committee co-opt her as our treasurer. This was unanimously agreed.

Chris Duffy is now working professionally as a solicitor and has offered to resume as our legal adviser. He is investigating the position re the SON funds. Donation to radio Mount Vernon of £1000 was made.

- Resident with details of a wedding at The Grange on 23/4/23 and the resulting congestion caused to traffic on Rickmansworth Road. He says, "I called the venue organisers who say that they are aware of the problem and that they have asked guests to move their cars and have asked their parking attendants to try and advise customers not to park their cars in this way. However, they say that Hillingdon is aware of the problem and refuses to put double yellow lines on both sides of the road next to the choke-point.

"So, I called Hillingdon this morning to register this problem and they say that it is up to the NRA to petition the local councillor to make this happen." Forwarded to PL/TE for acknowledgement.

- Resident seeking a befriender for her daughter who has learning disability. TE responded.

CRS Report

The RS Reception Thurs 27TH April held at St Matthews Church Hall was attended by just under 50 members and guests, slightly down from previous years, with 13 no-shows due to funerals, Covid and the less than enticing weather.

But a good time was had by all with Sarah Sharman providing her usual excellent cold and hot food, and with thanks again to Ros Plume for the decorations, and to Richard Plume for organising and manning the bar.

We are getting close to being able to go live with our new mmjo membership database, with Vijay Kotecha setting up directories to allow RSs and ARSs to see up-to-date information about the members on their individual patches – who has paid what as a sub, and when.

This was explained to RSs present and a lively Q&A about it ensued.

Last year we provided the capability for members to pay their subs by BACs and so far after the Spring Newsletter was distributed late March, over 160 have done so, including some RSs using this method to deposit nearly 100 subs they have already collected.

Coupling this with the > 250 subs deposited via Sharmans Chemist from members and some RSs as cash and cheques means we already have over 500 subs in for '23.

Traffic

Traffic & Highways – May 2023

Northwood Traffic Survey

I have had a brief discussion with Cllr. Higgins regarding lack of progress on this project over several years. He has asked me to update him with as much detail as possible so that he is well informed to take it up with the relevant Cabinet member. I will be doing this.

Ultra-Low Emission Zone

Hillingdon Council, along with Bexley, Bromley and Harrow and Surrey County have brought a legal action which will challenge the expansion in the High Court. I understand that this has been heard and a decision is due in the next few weeks.

Eastbury Road (close to Green Lane junction)

Work to "excavate to repair collapsed sewer pipe" has been completed on schedule.

Green Lane (near no.16)

There has been a gas leak in this area for several weeks. Investigation resulted in access covers being left up on the footpath while work proceeded (poorly signed). Temporary traffic lights appeared around 16th March and work (on the corner of Wilford Close) was completed on 22nd March, one day ahead of schedule.

Ruislip Lido Car Park Charge

From 3rd April the charges for parking at the Lido changed for an experimental trial period of 6 months. Hillingdon First cardholders now only get 3 hours free (was all day) and must pay £2.50 for a further 3 hours (£5 for May, June, July and August).

Health Report

Mount Vernon Cancer Centre

Developments at Paul Strickland Scanner Centre

The Centre provides comprehensive medical imaging services to NHS and private patients. There has been a scanner upgrade project with the installation of two new MRI scanners. A new PET-CT scanner with highly advanced artificial intelligence capabilities will be installed later this year. A new Waiting Room is now required to accommodate more patients.

Legacies and donations help fund new scanners, which must be replaced frequently to ensure the best possible patient care.

Currently, the Centre is involved in Research in Cervical Cancer to improve the survival chances of women with cervical cancer (EMPIRIC study). Also, at the Centre game-changing artificial intelligence software is being initially deployed.

Hillingdon Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust scores high on Cleanliness at Hillingdon Hospital and at Mount Vernon Hospital

The assessment scores were given in six categories: cleanliness; condition, appearance and maintenance; food and hydration; privacy, dignity and wellbeing; dementia and disability. Assessors were required to score what they saw on the day against the PLACE (Patient-Led Assessment of Care Environment) assessment criteria.

The 'cleanliness' scores were 99.7% at Hillingdon Hospital and 99.92% at Mount Vernon Hospital. The 'patient food' scores were 97.92% at Hillingdon Hospital and 97.22% at Mount Vernon Hospital.

Across the NWL Acute Provider Collaborative, HHNF Trust achieved the highest score for cleaning (99.92%) and the highest score for patient food (97.92%) and was in the highest scoring group of all London organisations for cleanliness and patient food.

Patients can now order meals at the touch of a button at Hillingdon Hospital

Patients are benefitting from a new meal system, which makes ordering food easier and cuts down on waste.

Using an app on a tablet operated at their bedside or on the ward by a housekeeper, patients at Hillingdon Hospital can choose their meal from the daily selection.

Called 'menuPick', the system, from health technology company Synbiotix, went live on Monday 17 April 2023.

The system is integrated with that of the Trust's patient meal supplier, Apetito, and uses pictures as well as meal descriptions on the menu.

This is the latest in a trio of recent digital innovations to help modernise Estates and Facilities services, following the successful introduction of e-portering and digital cleaning audits.

Watford General Hospital's multi-storey car park design secured top spot

Watford General Hospital's multi-storey car park won a national design award at the British Parking Awards 2022.

Its layout, improved disability access, quality of the construction, use of number plate recognition and contribution to carbon reduction are all factors which impressed the judges.

The new £40m facility – which opened on time and on budget earlier this year – is a welcome replacement for the ground level parking that preceded it. The fact that the first 30 minutes are free has been a great relief for friends and relatives who want a bit more time when dropping off or picking up patients.

Lifts in the car park open out onto a gently sloping ramp, which is much closer to the hospital's main entrance. This makes walking or pushing a wheelchair or pushchair much quicker and far easier than before.

Spaces within the car park are generous with 1,465 bays, including over 70 disabled parking bays, and the design means there are no tight corners to negotiate. Clear signage and surface marking make it easy to use and the lighting and access to 24 hour help are a major step forward in making its users feel safe and supported.

The route to the car park is along the recently opened Thomas Sawyer Way, taking cars away from Vicarage Road, which can be busy during rush hour. And having a three-laned entrance and number plate recognition makes for a smooth and quick entrance into the facility. There are also information boards displaying the number of car parking spaces available by floor.

The seven-floor car park is next to land earmarked for the redeveloped Watford General Hospital and will link directly to the new building (which has been granted outline planning permission). The trust is part of the national New Hospital Programme and is currently awaiting a government decision on funding. He added that the hospital's redevelopment plans feature more disabled bays and drop off and pick up zones.

Under the "report it" Hillingdon Council online scheme it is frequently difficult and time consuming to report an item raised by a NRA Member, particularly if a picture is to be included in the incident report as not all of the standard report categories allow image attachment. It was so much simpler & faster to email contactcentre1@hillingdon.gov.uk with an issue.

Travelling up Rickmansworth Road towards Mount Vernon Hp time after time there is traffic blockage as a result of functions taking place at The Grange where there is inadequate on-site parking. It becomes dangerous when their attending guests park on the opposite side of the road to The Grange for a length of 6 cars or more, or if parking on both sides of the road occurs. When roadside parking reaches 15 to 20 cars outside this event premises traffic mayhem results with traffic reduced to single lane driving – cars, buses, ambulances & lorries are all affected. How often does this have to be mentioned before action to reduce the allowed numbers attending The Grange to be set at a low figure, or for the Council to insist that The Grange gives over more of its land to car parking facilities? Is anyone listening?

OWL News

See extract from new figures:

OWL HEADLINES - April 2023

 Following a meeting of the police and NHW OWL leads across our three Boroughs, a request was made for pocket-size OWL publicity cards to be made available for SNTs on Hillingdon. As a result, NHW has given each SNT a pack of 100 cards (see right) to distribute to residents who are not already on OWL, with an option to request more cards once those have been deployed.



- · Hillingdon is now one of 17 Boroughs (of 32) on OWL, with Camden having just come online.
- · Congratulations to Northwood for adding the most new NHW members this month (+15).
- · CCTV Watch has now exceeded the 1,800 registered camera sites milestone.







Residents signed up to Hillingdon CCTV Watch as of 30-04-2023



CCTV Watch allows residents to be added to a separate set of Watches on OWL such that their locations can only be viewed by the Police or by Senior HNW Coordinators.

The CCTV locations cannot be viewed by Coordinators at the lower Ward or Watch levels. Breakdown of registered CCTV Systems by Ward will not be made publicly available.

Residents with domestic CCTV Systems who have agreed to be added to CCTV Watch have indicated that they are willing to be contacted through OWL in the event of a crime at or near their property. Officers can quickly and easily view the location of these CCTV sites on the OWL interactive map and send them targeted messages by selecting "CCTV Group". Signup can be requested by emailing hillingdoncctv@mail.com

A reminder that it is entirely lawful for domestic CCTV Systems to film beyond their boundary and into public spaces such as the paveme or road – there is no requirement to register with the ICO, and there is no requirement to pay a fee.

Residents must display a "CCTV in operation" sticker if their CTV films beyond their boundary.

Audio must not be captured beyond the curtilage of their property.

Slowly, beating the drum, OWL subscribers are increasing in Northwood. Up from 15% to 16%

We are also working on CCTV Watch. We are encouraging those with CCTV to join the Watch and help catch criminals in action.

Between 31-Mar and today Keith has achieved +13 sign-ups to the Hillingdon Business Watch.

Every business Keith visited with the SNT have also signed up for the WhatsApp Business group, with Jennifer from Three Wishes, who is co-ordinating the group.

This being garden backland remains the case as with the previous application as confirmed by the Planning Officer and Planning Committee, and the Local Plan states it will be supported only in exceptional circumstances.

Policy DMH 6: Garden and Backland Development: The requirement to be 'exceptional' as stated in the Local Plan must be restricted to exceptional on planning grounds. The simple definition of exceptional is closer to one in a hundred rather than ninety-nine in a hundred cases. This application is not exceptional on planning grounds.

Whilst this proposal might be smaller than in the previously refused application, the same principles apply and so this application should also be refused.

The streetscene should not be overridden. The proposed Site Plan shows a clear view of the proposed property from the street.

4 Rofant Road should be considered as being a neighbouring property to the proposed new house and the adverse impact of the proposed property taken fully into account,
