

Traffic and Highways

NORTHWOOD TRAFFIC STUDY

Some of you may remember that way back in 2017, as a result of pressure from the NRA, approval was given for officers to proceed with a transport study for the following roads:

- A404 Rickmansworth Road between Maxwell Road and A4180 Duck's Hill Road,
- Maxwell Road and
- B409 Green Lane

This study was carried out later that year and a detailed report with recommendations was published in 2018. In spite of pressure from the NRA, very little has happened since then, mainly due to financial constraints within the council. Recently the Leader of the Council, Cllr. Ian Edwards, asked me to forward details to him which I have done. Here is the response so far:

"The study has been revisited by officers and the intention remains to better facilitate pedestrians crossing at Rickmansworth Road j/w Green Lane. Now that TfL funding has resumed (although not to the previous level) consideration of this project is recommencing and the Director has diarised a meeting with ClIr Bianco, Cabinet Member for Highways, for early next month to progress".

ULEZ

By the time you read this the legal action brought by Hillingdon Council, along with Bexley, Bromley and Harrow and Surrey County, will have been heard and possibly a decision made.

The action has challenged the expansion in the High Court on five grounds:

- 1. Failure to comply with relevant statutory requirements
- Unlawful failure to consider expected compliance rates in outer London
- The proposed scrappage scheme was not consulted upon
- 4. Failure to carry out any cost benefit analysis
- 5. Inadequate consultation and/or apparent predetermination arising from the conduct of the consultation.

The expansion of the ULEZ area is still scheduled to take place on Tuesday, 29 August 2023.

From the Chairman

INTRODUCTION

Unless I've miscalculated, this is the 42nd time I have written a report for our newsletter. I do hope that I can still pen a few words that retain your interest. Here goes.

HEALTH

With the NHS in dire straits, with doctors ignoring their Hippocratic Oath and striking, and a large backlog following Covid, it is difficult to find good news.

In Hillingdon we are fortunate to have reasonably well-functioning hospitals and some excellent GP practices. Plans are proceeding to centralise routine orthopaedic surgery at Central Middlesex Hospital. Centralisation results in best use of staff and facilities, thus increasing throughput which should result in reducing waiting lists and saving money. Some work still needs to be done on organising patient transport.

As mentioned on page 4, the go-ahead has finally been approved to build the new hospital on the Hillingdon site. Unfortunately, as reported on page 5, money hasn't been found to finance the building of a hospital to replace the Mount Vernon Cancer Centre.

The old Minor Injuries Unit (now called the Nurse Care Practitioner Centre) at Mount Vernon is still working to appointment only. I recently met the Chairman of the North West London Acute Hospital group and asked why the unit cannot see patients on demand. He said that he has constantly asked Board members at NHS England for authority to do this, but they replied that it wasn't their policy to operate such units. Unresponsive, out of touch, inflexible bureaucracy at NHS England is one of the reasons for the current state of the NHS. I would like to hear from you if you would support a petition for the full re-opening of the Minor Injuries Unit.

POLICE

Sir Mark Rowley was appointed Commissioner of the Met last September. So far, we have seen no evidence of improved local policing. I have had discussions about the poor service provided by the Safer Neighbourhood Team with MP David Simmonds and Leader of the Council, lan Edwards and both have reported that they too have raised concerns about the state of policing with high-ranking officers and received promises that improvements are due soon. My concern is that any changes will be driven from the top down. Organisational change is only successful if it works upwards from the bottom.

In my last report I mentioned that our new sergeant, Gareth Blackburn, had promised higher visibility of officers. Unfortunately, this has not happened. We have an SNT contingent of two officers and a Police Community Support Officer (PCSO). One officer only works part time as he is studying for a law degree and our PCSO, John Usher, has been absent through illness and then through Met bureaucracy. John returned for duty in April but has not been able to come on to active duty because his Emergency Life Saving certificate had expired whilst he was ill. Met rules allow him to return to active duty only when he has renewed his certificate. He has been waiting for two months for an appointment to renew his certificate. To date there has been no appointment available as PCSOs do not take priority over Police Officers. It is now scheduled for 17th July. We look forward to his return to Northwood.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

Although the weather was inclement, we had a well-attended AGM on 20th April. Unfortunately, our planned speaker was unable to attend, and we were vey lucky that David Simmonds MP was able to stand in. David gave us an informative insight into government and the work he had done lately.

Yet again, there was no police presence. Our councillors Messrs
Lewis and Higgins fielded a very lively question time.

Two new members were appointed at the AGM. Vijay Kotecha is the new membership secretary and Rajen Shah looks after our IT. Welcome both.

At the AGM we were authorised to increase the size of our committee by two to sixteen.

As usual I am indebted to the committee members who devote much of their free time and keep us operating as a unit. Thank you all.

Now that the holiday season is here, please respect your neighbours and drive safely and considerately. The Met informs us that most of the drivers who are caught speeding in Northwood are Northwood residents!

Planning Matters

THERE HAVE BEEN 102 PLANNING APPLICATIONS for Northwood since the last Newsletter and, out of those, I submitted objections or comments on 27 of them on planning grounds directed at the adverse impact on the neighbours or others affected. The majority of applications continue to be for extensions to existing properties, although there have been some submitted for a full rebuild and for small blocks of flats or townhouses.

Dealing with planning applications that affect you is something that is a one-off for most people, and I'm happy to help guide through the process any neighbours who are concerned about a planning application close by. It remains the case that, once approved, neighbours cannot appeal against the decision except on a point of process, which is very limited indeed. Therefore, all applications that might affect you should be studied and dealt with preferably within the timescale referred to on the LBH planning portal.

Anyone can search for a planning application on the LBH portal using the following link to access the plans and other papers submitted by the applicant:

http://planning.hillingdon.gov.uk/OcellaWeb/planningSearch

Just enter the first part of the address in the 'Location,' box, and then 'View,' the documents.

Where you are adversely affected you can submit an objection directly on the LBH Planning portal. This is easy to do after viewing the documents, by going back to the first page and entering your objection by clicking/tapping the 'Enter Comment' box.

If you have any difficulty submitting your objection, then I will be pleased to help you.

If you want to present your case personally to the Planning Committee then you can do so by producing a petition with a minimum of 20 signatures of any residents living within LB Hillingdon. That will entitle you to speak at the Committee meeting for up to 5 minutes, and it's shown live on YouTube. I can help draft the petition.

Health Matters

WEBINAR ON ELECTIVE ORTHOPAEDIC CENTRE - was held on 20th June 2023.

The proposal to bring together most routine inpatient orthopaedic surgery in North West London in a new centre of excellence at Central Middlesex Hospital has been given the go-ahead by NHS North West London. This followed a 13-week public consultation involving almost 2,000 people.

Details were provided about working groups and opportunities for patient/public engagement at the Webinar. The new Orthopaedic Centre opening is expected in November 2023.

HILLINGDON HOSPITAL

The New Hospitals Programme will be backed by £20bn of investment to 2030 - announcement from the Government.

It confirmed a continued commitment to schemes previously announced as part of the programme – including Hillingdon. They therefore remain on track to deliver the new Hillingdon Hospital for the patients, staff and local people by 2030.



A Message From Our MP, David Simmonds

Despite widespread opposition, I am disappointed that Mayor Khan is still intent on pressing ahead with his controversial ULEZ expansion. With only a matter of weeks to go, we are reaching a critical point in our campaign to bring these plans to a standstill. I have been continuing my work with colleagues both in Westminster and across Hillingdon and Harrow Councils on behalf of the residents and local business owners who are going to be hit the hardest by this daily charge. Readers will be aware that the Judicial Review into the proposed expansion has been granted by the High Court on two grounds: the consultation process and the scrappage scheme. I am hopeful we will have a positive decision by the time this article is circulated.

Residents have also expressed concerns about what they view as a lack of police presence locally, which is something I raised with the Neighbourhood Superintendent for Hillingdon, Anthony Bennett, when I met with him at Uxbridge Police Station recently. I was encouraged by our conversation and the emphasis placed on increasing community engagement and improving the visibility of neighbourhood police. This will ensure residents feel safe, while also addressing the wider issue of rebuilding confidence and trust in the police.

On this topic, there have been discussions about the Mayor's closure of police stations across London, with Northwood and Ruislip both acting as prime examples. These closures have resulted in the loss of established local bases that residents have relied upon for safety and reassurance. There has been some welcome news, however, that following a six-year campaign led by

Conservative councillors in Hillingdon, the Mayor has reversed his decision to close Uxbridge Police Station. While this is incredibly positive, I am sceptical that it is a political move to support



his candidate in the Uxbridge and South Ruislip by-election. Of course, if the Mayor is sincere, I trust that he will provide us with assurances as to the long-term plan for the station and go further to support other police stations across London threatened with closure, which I have had the opportunity to call for in Parliament.

Mount Vernon Cancer Centre Review

A team from Mount Vernon Cancer Centre, NHS England and UCLH is continuing talks with national colleagues to secure funding to relocate the cancer centre after it was not included on the list of schemes in the Government's New Hospitals Programme. It is understood MVCC is one of a small number of high priorities for any alternative sources of funding.

It is widely accepted there is an urgent need to re-provide Mount Vernon cancer services on an acute hospital site, as the current site cannot provide the right support that the cancer services need to provide a full range of treatments and trials for patients. At present, many patients have to have their

treatment split across different hospitals, and the majority of services that are provided on the site are done so from aging buildings and facilities that are increasingly problematic to maintain.

Relocation to a site adjacent to Watford General Hospital remains the preferred long-term option, and the right one for patients.

Following the decision to keep MVCC out of the New Hospitals Programme, UCLH remains committed to helping to find a capital solution to improve MVCC for patients and staff.

An independent clinical review concluded that MVCC needs to be managed by a specialist cancer provider and UCLH was identified as the preferred future provider. Since then, UCLH has been working with NHS England and East and North Hertfordshire NHS Trust to support the delivery of high-quality cancer services from Mount Vernon Cancer Centre and to

develop plans for a new MVCC on an acute site. Subject to these discussions, and some remaining due diligence work, it is the intention that UCLH would then take over running the services from East and North Hertfordshire NHS Trust.

Dear Residents,

This the first time I'm writing for NRA and would like to take this opportunity to introduce myself to all the residents.



I am PC Maninder Kaur Sohal, a police officer in the Metropolitan Police Service. I joined in October 2019 and worked on the Emergency Response Police team (ERPT) in Hillingdon before transferring to Northwood SNT where I am currently working.

During my time at ERPT I gained skills including dealing with domestics, theft and all other response crimes. Due to dealing with crime reactively I became confident in dealing with complex situations and undertaking multiple roles under high pressure. I also gained key skills in dealing with both suspects and victims which I have transferred to my role working as a Dedicated Ward Officer dealing with community and neighbour disputes. Community engagement is my favourite part of my job, I enjoy talking to people from different backgrounds, engaging with them at a personal level to understand their concerns and issues.

The Northwood Team maintains a policing presence through community engagements such as Crime Prevention Stalls, Drop-in Surgeries, Coffee with a Copper sessions and Walk and Talk sessions. The community engages with the team providing invaluable intelligence and support which the team greatly appreciates. († See note below)

We are glad that the Business Watch for Northwood is now up and running which is fantastic news. This will assist the team in gathering more intelligence and help prevent crime.

As a female PC, I take violence against women and girls very seriously by the team and so we are offering Walk and Talk sessions. The Walk and Talk initiative involves female officers pairing up with women from the community to go out on patrol in open spaces so that they can hear first-hand their experiences, concerns and reflections. The aim of the walkabout is to start a conversation between the public and officers about their safety concerns and what police can do, working with partners, to address them.

As the weather gets better, we advise that property windows are closed and secure when you are going out. Please do not leave any valuables in your vehicles as this only provides thieves with an incentive and please do not leave your vehicle windows open in the hot weather.

The team continues to carry out weapon sweeps at various locations in the ward. So far, no weapons or knives have been found which is always good news. Targeted patrols continue to take place in crime hot spots for ASB, Burglary, Robbery, Drug and Motor Vehicle crime. The team is considering the introduction of Street Briefings.

We would like to thank our residents for their continued support, it is greatly appreciated. Thank you!

Hillingdon Neighbourhood Watch

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH is one of the largest and most successful voluntary crime prevention initiatives currently in existence countrywide. At its most basic level, Neighbourhood Watch consists of a group of like-minded neighbours getting together to help reduce crime where they live, by being alert to suspicious activity and reporting it to

the police, thereby making their community safer.

Membership of Neighbourhood Watch is free – there is no subscription. Members act as unpaid volunteers for the benefit of their local community.



Neighbourhood Watch is all about looking out for each other. Neighbours uniting and acting together means that dozens of eyes and ears are able to pick up on anything happening in the neighbourhood that could cause worry or concern. It is not about being nosy or interfering, it is about being a good neighbour, caring for

your community, and reporting crime and potential problems, hence the Meerkats on the Neighbourhood Watch signs.

There is an active partnership between Northwood Neighbourhood Watch, which is part of Hillingdon Neighbourhood Watch (HNW), and the Northwood Police Safer Neighbourhood Team to reduce the opportunity for others to commit crime, or help solve a crime that has happened.

ONLINE WATCH LINK (OWL) is the communications platform used by the Northwood Police Safer Neighbourhood Team (SNT) to communicate with Neighbourhood Watch members. The SNT posts regular updates on crime prevention, their regular community engagement events, and the monthly newsletter. The SNT also uses OWL to link to the Ward survey that provides the opportunity for residents to highlight their concerns about local crime and anti-social behaviour. If you have a CCTV system or a video doorbell, you can register these on OWL on 'CCTV Watch' which will enable the police to contact you in the event of a crime being committed in your locality, to see if any useful images have been captured.



You can join OWL either by using the QR code shown above, or by signing up on **owl.co.uk/met**

OWL has been operating in Hillingdon since 2018. In that time it has grown to over 17,500 members, of whom over 1,820 members are registered on CCTV Watch.

The role of a **NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH STREET COORDINATOR** is to engage with their neighbours, and encourage them to register with OWL and CCTV Watch, when installed. If you would like to volunteer to be a Street Coordinator, or establish a Neighbourhood Watch in your street, please email Hillingdon Neighbourhood Watch at: **hillingdonnhw@gmail.com** and provide your details together with a contact number and you will be contacted.

NORTHWOOD BUSINESS WATCH. A recent initiative of Northwood Neighbourhood Watch has been to work in a collaborative partnership with the Northwood Residents' Association, the Safer Neighbourhood Team, and the Northwood Police Ward Panel to establish a Northwood Business Watch. This initial scheme covers businesses in the shopping area of Green Lane, Maxwell Road and Station Approach.

The aim of Northwood Business Watch is to reduce business crime and anti-social behaviour, which will help to continue to keep Northwood a safe and secure environment for residents, business owners, staff, customers, and visitors. Urgent or important information is disseminated through a messaging group.

Scams are about! Please don't get caught!

Unfortunately, scams have become part of life and unlikely to go away. Whether they arrive by email, letter or text message, we all need to be wary. Residents have brought a couple to our attention recently:

- 1. **People's Postcode Lottery.** This comes in the form of a letter addressed to an individual and looks pretty convincing until you read that "To begin your claim, contact ... for the processing and remittance of your money" when alarm bells should ring. You cannot win a lottery unless you have entered. You must be a player of People's Postcode Lottery to win a prize. Legitimate lotteries don't ask you to pay taxes, custom fees, insurance shipping, handling fees etc before you can receive your 'winnings'.
- 2. PayPal invoice. This one comes by email and states that "PayPal has given its approval to your request" It gives a contact number in the USA and attaches a pdf document. If you receive a suspicious email from PayPal, please forward it to phishing@paypal.com

There is plenty of advice available online about avoiding scams e.g. on the Met Police site: www.met.police.uk/littlemedia If in doubt, DON'T CLICK, PHONE or respond in any way.

In May, Rabbi Aaron Goldstein, a Senior Rabbi at The Ark Synagogue, travelled a total of 30 hours to meet Ark twin communities in Lviv and Lutsk, Ukraine in person.

Rabbi Aaron was told of the impact of the Ark's weekly online connections to morale. This was sorely needed as they heard of the trauma living

with relatives and friends fighting and being killed, a winter of blackouts, cold and air strikes and warnings.

The communities were swelled by refugees, now homeless, from Donetsk, Luhansk and Mariupol. From Mariupol, we heard from Dennis who spoke of his mother and his bombed-out apartment block, living for weeks in the basement in -10 degrees, dodging snipers to get firewood and water; an evacuation route whilst the Theatre was bombed and the mental torture of moving through nearly 20 Russian checkpoints.

Rabbi Aaron welcomed by a Ukrainian family The financial support that The Ark congregants donated has enabled support for the refugees and members to purchase medicine and even a course of chemotherapy.

The presence of Rabbi Aaron was met with joy and tears, especially when they left with the words, "L'shanah ha'ba-ah b'Lutsk u'Lviv - To next year in Lutsk and Lviv."



The second half of the 19th century saw the development of a distinct Russian style, for example, expressed in pieces by Glinka, Musorgsky, Balakirev and others.
