Traffic and Highways

POTHOLES

From this October, Hillingdon Council is changing how it repairs potholes and uneven road surfaces across the Borough. By switching to a more efficient and cost-effective system, the new material will help to prolong the life of the Hillingdon's roads and is a more environmentally friendly method of repair.

The system uses a fast-setting waterproof liquid called 'Elastomac' which is quicker to install and roads can be reopened just 10 minutes after the repair. The system uses 80% less energy than traditional asphalt repairs, 85% less carbon and halves the overall costs.

I understand that the transition to a quicker and more costeffective and sustainable repair system will enable the LBH's highways repairs team to work more efficiently, with less disruption for residents and road users, while contributing to the council's pledge to reduce its carbon footprint.

Apparently this repair system uses recycled materials and will reduces time, energy, costs and the council's carbon footprint, while also minimising disruption for road users. It will also enable smaller road repairs to be tackled quickly, before they become a bigger problem.



Elastomac in use

Traditional pothole repairs can be time-consuming and energy intensive, relying heavily on fossil fuels. The hole needs to be widened and filled with asphalt which is then compacted. Elastomac is a made from 70% recycled materials, including road surface shavings and car tyres. This is poured directly into a pothole with no need to widen it, no compaction needed and there's no waste to remove as there is no excavation.

NORTHWOOD LIBRARY

Following the closure of our library, due to subsidence, Hillingdon Council has confirmed that a new replacement library will be built. In the meantime, they are looking for local premises in which to instal a temporary replacement.

POLICE

In past newsletters I have expressed my dissatisfaction with the performance of our Safer Neighbourhood Team (SNT). At last, I have some positive news. Hillingdon now has a devoted police chief in Superintendent Anthony Bennett. We used to share the chief with two other boroughs. We also have a Chief Inspector, Ben Wright, whose role is to manage neighbourhood policing. Hoda Lacey and I now have a line of communication to the Chief Inspector, and we can already see improvement.

In August, the Met held an open evening at Brunel University and the Deputy Commissioner, Dame Lynne Owens, gave us an outline as to how London's policing will improve. It was reassuring how open she was during the question-and-answer session.



If you are not already signed up to OWL, please do so to keep informed of SNT events/happenings in Northwood. Details are on page 7. We have to continue to challenge the Met to get the service we deserve. Do contact Hoda Lacey, our police liaison representative, if you need more information.

NORTHWOOD CENTRE

It has been established that the most successful town centres are those where cars are accepted as a necessary way of life. They have adequate free or cheap local parking, both onstreet and in local car parks. Unfortunately, Hillingdon Council does not accept this fact and the high parking fees charged lead to many of our Eastbury neighbours taking their trade to Rickmansworth.

Health Matters

DEVELOPMENT OF THE NORTH WEST LONDON ELECTIVE ORTHOPAEDIC CENTRE

The North West London Acute Provider Collaborative (comprising of the four North West London acute NHS trusts) has agreed to bring together much of the routine, inpatient orthopaedic surgery for the population of North West London in a purpose-designed, centre of excellence at Central Middlesex Hospital.

PHASED OPENING

There will be a phased opening of the North West London Elective Orthopaedic Centre (NWL EOC) from November 2023 through to February 2024, with an initial operating capacity of three theatres, increasing to five theatres by the end of February 2024.

NEW PATIENT RECORDS SYSTEM. Hillingdon Hospital Trust is about to make the move to a new electronic patient records system (Cerner EPR). This patient record system will then be in use by all four North West London acute trusts, allowing safe and where appropriate, sharing of health records seamlessly across trusts. This is an essential element of the NWL EOC (and all acute healthcare), allowing for the streamlining of inter-trust referrals across a large geographical area.

The NWL EOC will focus on 'high volume, low complexity' bone and joint procedures, including knee and hip replacements, leaving other hospitals in north west London room to focus on more complex orthopaedic procedures.

Plans to redevelop Hillingdon Hospital

The main news on the continued progress towards a new Hillingdon Hospital is that the Trust has selected a contractor to get the site fully ready for building work to start.





The successful company is GRAHAM, which will oversee a number of projects:

- The Furze refurbishment
- The Tudor Centre extension
- On-site low voltage cable diversions
- A temporary staff car park
- Services diversion and demolitions.

The current Hillingdon Hospital will remain fully open as normal throughout the delivery of these projects, which complement other works in progress including the first phase of establishing the electrical infrastructure required for the new hospital.

All works are subject to final funding and technical approvals, but we expect the next works at Hillingdon Hospital to be the Furze refurbishment and the services diversions projects which are anticipated to start later this year.

The above projects form the last stage of the Trust's five year decant and enabling programme and subject to final approvals, we are working towards clearing space for the development of the new Hillingdon Hospital by mid-2025.

We also welcomed various candidates into and around the site during the recent Uxbridge and South Ruislip by-election campaign. What is more, both the main parties have pledged to build the new Hillingdon Hospital.

The Secretary of State for Health and Social Care re-confirmed that Hillingdon remained part of their new hospitals manifesto commitment while Labour's shadow health minister pledged to deliver a new hospital within a similar timeframe during the first term of a labour government, should they win the next election.

A Message From Our MP, David Simmonds

It feels as though every article starts with a word on ULEZ, but I am aware that local opposition to the expansion of the scheme continues. As recent data suggests, there has been no effect on air quality which in my opinion further confirms that residents are being unfairly penalised by a policy that does little to tackle the actual causes of air pollution. The Mayor must do more with the clean air grant to provide meaningful alternatives to encourage the uptake of cleaner methods on travel.

WE ALL WANT CLEAN AIR TO BREATHE.

I have been arguing for a while that in addition to our proximity to Heathrow, increased traffic on residential roads and more cars idling in that traffic are contributors to poor air quality locally. I know from speaking with schools and parents that this a particular concern during the school rush, and so I am pleased that schools have introduced initiatives like walking buses to help address this. I will be writing to others to encourage them to look at this, as I feel it could be a solution to the problem, potentially taking a lot of cars off the road or at least in the most congested central areas.

Continuing this theme, I am aware that the planning application for the old Northwood Police Station has been refused. While the wider community benefit was largely supported by residents, traffic was a huge concern. I know from personal experience how exceptionally busy this location is during peak times, and it was right that residents sought a high degree of assurance on this as part of the planning process.

Turning to other local matters, our local libraries are valuable community assets and so I was concerned to hear about the temporary closure of Northwood Library as a result of slow progressing structural issues affecting the building. Further surveys

are now required to understand the extent of the issue, but I have been assured that Hillingdon Council are continuing to monitor the situation closely.

I note that there

is a petition to allow non-Hillingdon Northwood residents to buy a Hillingdon First card, given that many who may live just over the boundary regularly travel into the borough. I do see the value in this, and so I will take a look at the petition and discuss with councillors who will help to form a decision on the matter.

Mount Vernon Cancer Centre - building improvement works

Last year the Mount Vernon Cancer Centre (MVCC) was awarded £7.5 million to refurbish and renovate the cancer centre building, improving the space and facilities for patients, visitors and staff whilst planning for a new Cancer Centre continues. The building works started in February, are well underway and being completed in a phased approach until late summer 2024.



The works include improvements to the chemotherapy suite, outpatients department, main cancer centre building, inpatient wards (wards 10 and 11), radiotherapy wing and nuclear medicine. Across these areas an extensive range of refurbishment work is being carried out including refitting and improving our clinical rooms, kitchens, toilets and bathrooms, replacing flooring, windows and redecorating and plastering throughout. Some internal and external doors and lighting will also be replaced. Alarm, electrical, fire and water systems will also be upgraded and renovated in line with the latest regulations.

Patients may find that their appointment or treatment is not being held where expected or they might hear noise or experience some disruption while our contractors are working on site. We apologise for any inconvenience and thank patients and visitors for their patience and cooperation as we make these important changes to modernise our cancer centre and improve our facilities.

To support patients and ensure they are aware of the building works, we have information posters and banners on display in the cancer centre and a message in all patient letters. We will share further updates as key stages of the works are completed.

National discussions are continuing around funding for the relocation of the cancer centre following the review of its long term sustainability, and the local community, patients and staff will be updated once a solution is identified.

The team has been extremely busy lately, conducting hivisibility patrols on Green Lane, its surrounding roads and the High Street, as well as dealing with anti-social behaviour issues that require ongoing Police intervention and presence. Northwood SNT has continued to maintain its focus on the current ward priorities of Violence Against Women and Girls, shoplifting and engagements.

The team has been involved in some great community events lately. There was an operation on Ducks Hill Road which involved the Met Police and Thames Valley Police horse mounted branches and the Horse Society. This event was to raise awareness to drivers about being cautious and to slow down when approaching horses on our roads.

We attended a local nursery to talk to the children, where the school theme was 'people that help them'; it was great to see the smiles on the children's faces when we turned up. We have increased our community engagements, by adding more of them with different locations and times to suit community needs. Local Policing from the NRA Police Liaison Officer

Do you know about our quarterly Residents' Survey to include your opinion about our Northwood Policing?

No, I didn't think so. You see, our local Safer Neighbourhood Team (SNT) send a survey to all Northwood residents who are subscribed to OWL. The survey is sent on OWL, via X (Twitter), the Northwood SNT Facebook page and, soon, Nextdoor.co.uk

Despite the wide distribution of the survey, the number of your responses is disappointing. You see, your responses are collated and used for the Ward Panel to decide on SNT priorities for the coming quarter. With so few responses, it makes our job even harder.

The first priority is set by the Basic Command Unit. The panel then has freedom to choose priorities 2 and 3 in accordance with the crime figures and the results of the survey. Currently we have:

Priority I – Set by the Safer Neighbourhood Team to include Violence or drivers of Violence. This broad category can include all violence types and can include Gangs, Drugs, Domestic Assaults, Violence against women and vulnerable people, public space safety, alcohol fueled violence and antisocial behaviour linked violence.

The next two priorities set by you, the residents of Northwood, as collated from your responses to the quarterly survey.

Priority 2 - Theft, especially shoplifting – work with Tesco and Waitrose to improve the number of crime reports.

Priority 3 - Work with vulnerable communities and report back on what has been and can be done/achieved to reduce opportunities for crime., more engagement.

I hope those of you reading this column will get in touch with your views. Every one of you is important in shaping the Northwood police priorities. If you don't contribute, please don't complain when things don't go your way.

Northwood Neighbourhood Watch

Northwood Neighbourhood Watch, in common with Neighbourhood Watches throughout the country, is made up of like-minded neighbours who volunteer to work together to help reduce crime and the fear of crime by being alert to suspicious activity and reporting it to the police, thereby making their community safer. If you would like to join Northwood Neighbourhood Watch, or volunteer to be a Street Coordinator, please email Hillingdon Neighbourhood Watch at: hillingdonnhw@gmail.com

Membership of Northwood Neighbourhood Watch is free – there is no subscription.

Neighbourhood Watch members are not encouraged to engage with criminals, merely to make a note of what is happening, record the incident if it is safe to do so and, where possible, provide CCTV or other images of the incident to the Police.

Online Watch Link (OWL) is the communications platform used by the Northwood Police Safer Neighbourhood Team (SNT) to communicate with Neighbourhood Watch members on crime prevention and their regular community engagement events, such as 'weapons sweeps' when isolated areas are searched to recover discarded weapons or other evidence of criminal activity. To date, weapons sweeps in Northwood have not uncovered any evidence of criminality, which is reassuring.




Don't miss out on local policing matters, join OWL today!

The SNT uses OWL to publish their monthly newsletter and advertise the Ward survey that allows residents to highlight concerns about local crime and anti-social behaviour. CCTV systems and video doorbells can be registered on OWL under 'CCTV Watch'. This will assist the police in the aftermath of a crime being committed in your locality, to see if any useful images have been captured.

Northwood Business Watch

Northwood Business Watch was created in April 2023, following a meeting at the Three Wishes Public House in Green Lane, between representatives of the Northwood Business Community, Northwood Residents' Association, Northwood Police Ward Panel and Hillingdon Neighbourhood Watch. The initiative is supported by the

Northwood Police Safer Neighbourhood Team and Hillingdon Councillor Henry Higgins.

The purpose of the initiative was to create a community-driven programme that preserves the existing safe environment by reducing the opportunities for criminality and other anti-social behaviour through sharing real-time information.

The location chosen for the initial Business Watch was the commercial area around Green Lane, Maxwell Road and Station Approach. Criminal activities and the associated fear of crime were starting to pose an increased level of concern for businesses and their customers.

Currently there are 75 businesses and 81 individuals signed up to Northwood Business Watch. Some businesses have more than one staff member signed up to the WhatsApp group, which is used to communicate with members and is coordinated by me.

All businesses are encouraged to join the Northwood Residents' Association as a Business Member, which, in the

absence of a Chamber of Commerce, fulfils that role. They are also encouraged to join OWL, the communication group for Hillingdon Neighbourhood Watch and Hillingdon Police.

The Northwood Business Watch WhatsApp group shares information on suspicious individuals, active crimes and other anti-social behaviour. Where available, images of individuals involved in crimes are posted on the WhatsApp group. Advice on Crime Prevention and related issues are also shared.

When a crime has occurred, Northwood Business Watch members are encouraged to report the matter to the Police via the 999, or 101 systems, or online at www.met.police.uk. In addition, the Business Watch Coordinator emails the Northwood Safer Neighbourhood Team to alert them to the incident.

The area covered by Northwood Business Watch is delineated by the standard yellow 'Neighbourhood Watch' signs, (donated by Hillingdon Neighbourhood Watch), with the addition of 'Northwood Business Watch' stickers, (sponsored by Northwood Residents' Association).

There are plans to incorporate businesses in Northwood High Street into the Northwood Business Watch WhatsApp group, and businesses in Northwood Hills are planning to introduce their own version of Business Watch.

Planning Matters

THERE HAVE BEEN 47 PLANNING APPLICATIONS since the last Newsletter and, out of those, I submitted objections or comments on five of them on planning grounds directed at the adverse impact on the neighbours or others affected. The majority of applications continue to be for extensions to existing properties, with just a limited number for demolition of the whole building and erection of a new build.

Dealing with planning applications that affect you is something that is a one-off for most, and I'm happy to help guide through the process any neighbours or others affected who are concerned about a planning application close by. It remains the case that, once approved, only the applicant can appeal against the decision except on a point of process, which is very limited indeed. Therefore, all applications that might affect you should be studied and dealt with preferably within the timescale referred to on the LBH planning portal.

SEARCH FOR AN APPLICATION. It is easy to search for a planning application on the LBH portal using the following link to access the plans and other papers submitted by the applicant:

http://planning.hillingdon.gov.uk/OcellaWeb/planningSearch Just enter the first part of the address in the 'Location,' box, and then 'View,' the documents.

WISH TO OBJECT? Where you are adversely affected you can submit an objection directly onto the LBH Planning portal. This is easy to do after viewing the documents, by going back to the first page and entering the objection by pressing the 'Enter Comment' box.

If you have any difficulty submitting your objection, then I will be pleased to help you.

PERHAPS A PETITION WOULD HELP? If you want to present your case personally to the Planning Committee then you can do so by producing a petition with a minimum of 20 signatures of any residents living within LB Hillingdon. That will entitle you to speak at the Committee meeting for up to five minutes, and it's shown live on YouTube. I can help draft the petition.

Sponsor a tree outside your home



The Environment

Last year a resident reported persistent flooding in Rofant Road by the junction of Eastbury Avenue, Frithwood and Rofant Roads with Eastbury Road after heavy rains, and his pleas for help appeared to gain limited attention. This resident made contact with the NRA, perhaps out of frustration, and asked for our help. Appropriate overtures were made to our council contacts and with Counsellor Henry Higgins, a case was raised. This September whilst driving in the area I noticed groundwork and pipe laying in progress. That looked like a good result - as the saying goes 'persistence pays off'.

If you have an issue that comes under the broad heading of 'The Environment', please do bring it to my attention.

In conversation with two astute residents, remarks about the positioning of ULEZ cameras were made. Some residents have worked out how to reroute their main local journeys to avoid their car registration number being recorded. Ingenuity and talent come to the fore in adversity – it is a trend with us humans! But surely, driving further to avoid a fine will cost the motorist more in fuel, not to mention the effect that has on the environment.

We are very concerned about the state of Northwood's pavements.

A number of residents have told us that they have tripped on uneven surfaces. When the information is passed to me, I inform the council, but in most cases nothing is done. See the Chairman's report on Page 3 for more on this.

What I am asking you to do, is to keep reporting damaged pavements to me and copy to CIIr Higgins.

R uislip Woods News

Friends of Ruislip Woods

Ruislip Woods, the largest single area of Ancient Woodland in Greater London was designated a National Nature Reserve (NNR) in 1997 and is visited by over 200,000 people each year. In 2006 it was awarded Green Flag and Green Heritage status.

The "Friends" are run by Ruislip Woods Trust which is a charity set up in May 1997 to develop the educational and monitoring aspects of the Woods – all designed to ensure that our members understand what changes are occurring (both natural and man -made) and provide accurate information and news via our newsletter which we publish three times per year. We raise money for projects and provide support where we can for the volunteer groups in the Woods.

Himalayan Balsam is an invasive species which shades out our natural plants along some of the streams in the NNR and is a big problem in Copse Wood and the Local Nature Reserve. Having obtained funding from Affinity Water to purchase battery operated hedge trimmers and associated equipment, the Trust advertised three Balsam removal mornings in Copse Wood in July 2023 which were attended by more than 50 people, some of whom were the regular woods volunteers. Large areas of Balsam were cleared and below are photos of the task, before, after and some of the volunteers taking part.







It may be pretty, but Balsam is an invasive species.

In addition to the above, Ruislip Woods Trust has:

- Developed descriptive, coloured waymarked trails covering all the woods.
- Organised guided walks including Bat Walks each year.
- Set up the Classroom in the Woods which is now run by Diana Williams under supervision from Hillingdon Council. For more details and for schools to book please contact Diana on

- Negotiated the successful purchase of the remaining 30 acres of Copse
 Wood in October 2020 which has now been incorporated into the NNR.

ride and afternoon tea. Our local projects included having a stall at the Pinner Village Show and joining in with the Northwood Residents Association pop-up event in the town centre.

Our club President, Susan Carr is also the Hunger & Homelessness Officer for our Lions District 105a which includes 65 clubs reaching from Bedford to The Thames. Her role is to encourage all clubs to support the local Food Banks and Homeless Shelters and undertake other projects in their area.

Lions clubs in rural areas join forces with local farmers to take part in Gleaning Projects.

WHAT IS GLEANING? A term used to describe collecting and redistributing perfectly edible and nutritious fruit and vegetables



from farms and orchards that would otherwise be surplus. Research has shown that farmers are unable to use around 16% of their crop before it even leaves the field or barn - often due to factors beyond their control, such as produce not being the right shape or size for supermarket tastes, cancelled orders or poor weather.

The Felix Project is one of the main charities in London collaborating to rescue surplus food direct from farms together with *The Lions Gleaning Hub*, nationwide and *Still Good Food* in East Anglia.

Northwood Library to close temporarily to facilitate building surveys

Friday 29 September 2023: Hillingdon Council has made the decision to temporarily close Northwood Library from Saturday 30 September to carry out extensive building surveys.

As regular library visitors will already be aware, the building has had some slow progressing structural issues which the council has been closely monitoring.

A survey was recently conducted, with the results this week highlighting that more intrusive surveys are now required to examine its subsidence and the building will need to be closed to

facilitate this. There is no reinforced autoclaved aerated concrete (RAAC) in the building.

While the surveys are underway, residents will be able to use nearby Northwood Hills Library, which will extend its opening hours. It is only 1.2 miles away and one stop along on the Metropolitan tube line or a short journey via the 282 or H11 bus.

Cllr Jonathan Bianco, Deputy Leader of Hillingdon Council and Cabinet Member for Property, Highways and Transport, said: "We have been closely monitoring the changes to Northwood Library's condition, and these surveys will enable us to further understand the extent of the issue.

"While the surveys are underway, nearby Northwood Hills Library is a great temporary alternative and boasts a wonderful schedule of activities and sessions for residents to participate in as well as a broad range of books and reference materials.

"Our libraries are valuable community assets, and our Library Strategy sets out our commitment to maintaining 16 across the borough, including Northwood, and further investing in buildings and facilities to ensure they are of the highest quality and meet residents' needs now and in the future."

Residents can collect their recycling bags and visitor parking vouchers at Northwood Hills Library.

Most of Northwood library's events will be running from Northwood Hills library at their usual times until further notice.
